Mr. Henry George's "Theories." Mr. Henry George of New York, writes, notifying us that he sends a copy of the Standard free for six weeks to be discontinued at the end of that time unless we subscribe for it.

Mr. George's theory and that of the anti-poverty society, as we gather it from what we have read, is about this: Abolish all taxes except the tax on land and make this so high that it would not be to the interest of any man to hold more land than he could actually occupy and cultivate, and thus be compelled in self defense to sell or give the surplus to others.

The right of property in land, like the right of property of man in man, is but the right of property in human toil; and if another man can by any excuse get a right of property in your toil without giving you an equivalent in his own toil what becomes of this grand Jeffersonian principle of enjoying the gains of your own honest industry?

"Farmer" to "Ned." Edward D. Flatreec reminds me of a story a leading Democrat, and office holder, of Iron county, told me by way of illustrating the idea the average Democrat had of Democracy. "Now Jim, you're going to vote the good old Democratic ticket to-day and I want you to tell me before you start what Democracy is?"

Now, "Ned," don't, please don't make me feel as small as "X" did. One night when I was a youngster, alone and unarmed, I met a "bar." When I had got my heart, wind, and muscle screwed up to Davy Crockett pitch I found it was only a black calf, and I felt as badly let down as I did when I found that "X" knew nothing of what he was talking about, except by reading some of my scribbling, and he had misunderstood that.
