St. Louis Correspondence. The Naked Logic. In the supreme court opinion in the Kansas case Mr. Justice Harlan has succeeded in giving a forcible summary of the logic of Republicanism which is also the logic of Prohibition.

First—That right and wrong are not self-evident and fixed, but merely relative. Second—That right can injure right. Third—That right and wrong being not self-evident, but relative, there must be some superior arbiter to declare year by year what is right and wrong.

This is evident if right is merely relative and it follows necessarily not only that the right claimed in this case is not "inherent," but that there can be no inherent right. All rights under this view are held subject to the moral sense of the majority and dependent on it.

positive—not indeterminate and vague, but determinate, axiomatic, self-evident; not to be determined temporarily as expediency, by statistics, but eternal and unchangeable. Second—That right cannot wrong right, and that the injury of one right by another right is self-contradictory and absurd.

But brethren and fellow-Democrats, it is not so. Right is an eternal verity, and it remains steadfast, however much expediency may shift and veer. It is not for us to claim privileges. We may even waive rights, but they must not be denied us. Our responsibility, without which there is no liberty of conscience or of action may not be taken from us or hidden from us by the legerdemain of statistics.

LOCAL OPTION LAW. The following is the Local Option bill as passed by the Missouri Legislature: Senate Bill 140. Introduced by Senator Wood.

AN ACT To provide for the preventing of the evils of intemperance by local option in any County in this State, and in cities, towns and inhabited places, or more, by submitting the question of prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors to the qualified voters of such County or City; to provide penalties for its violation, and for other purposes.

SEC. 1. That upon application by petition, signed by one-tenth of the qualified voters of any county who shall reside outside of the corporate limits of any city or town, having at the time of such petition a population of twenty-five hundred inhabitants or more, or who is not a qualified voter of such county, provided that no such election, held under the provisions of this act, shall take place on any general election day, or within sixty days of any general election held under the constitution and laws of this state, so that such elections are held under this act, shall be special elections and shall be separate and distinct from any other elections whatever. Provided, further that the county court shall determine the insufficiency of the petition presented, by the poll-books of the last previous general election.
