University of the State of Missouri.

COLUMBIA, Boone Co., Mo., July 1, 1892.

To the Clerk of the Iron County Court: It is my duty to inform you that, under the provisions of Section 5783, Revised Statutes of Missouri, 1892, your county is entitled to send to the departments of the State University at Columbia and Rolla, during the year ending June 1, 1893, five students, between the ages of sixteen and twenty-five years. Under the rules adopted by the Board of Curators, students "shall possess a good moral character, and shall pass a satisfactory examination in arithmetic and in the principles of English grammar and written composition, and shall pass the following examinations: For the school of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts ten dollars. Examination for admission will be given by the English and mathematical departments on Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Monday, September 8, 9, 10, and 12, preceding the opening of the University. The session of all the departments will begin on the Second Tuesday, (13th) of September, and will continue until the first Thursday of June, 1893—except that of the School of Mines and Metallurgy at Rolla, which will begin and end one week later, and the Law School which opens October 4th, 1892. The Missouri State Military School is now a department of the State University, (Missouri Rev. Stat., 1892, Secs. 6227-31). Each Senator and Representative in the General Assembly is expected to appoint one cadet from his district during the month of August. These cadets after passing the required examinations will be admitted to the Academic departments of the University free of tuition. Two complete uniforms will be furnished by the State to each cadet. The College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts, has been re-organized with additional teaching force and greater facilities. Ample provision has been made for the education and care of young women in all the classes of the University. See catalogue 1892, page 55. Six new and modern buildings are now being constructed to replace the old main building which was destroyed by fire on January 9, 1892. I beg to call your attention to the appended extract from the law on this subject. You will please, after giving two weeks' publication to this certificate, transmit to me, on or before September 1st, a list of the names of all the youth of your county who intend to make application for entrance into the University at the commencement of the next session. If such a list is not transmitted, students from other counties will be allowed to enter in lieu of those to which your county is entitled. Board can be had in the University boarding clubs for male students at \$1.75 per week and upward; in private families at \$3.00 to \$4.50. I am very respectfully, your obedient servant, J. G. RABB, Secretary. Board of Curators, University of Missouri.

"The Secretary of the Board of Curators shall cause to be transmitted to the Clerk of each County Court in this State a certificate, stating the number of pupils that such county is entitled to send to the State University the next scholastic year, which certificate shall be published by each County Clerk for two weeks, in a newspaper published in such county. The expense thereof to be allowed by the County Court and paid for out of the County Treasury." Persons desiring to enter the State University at Columbia, or Rolla, are required to make known their intention to me on or before September 1st.
