THE work of removing Republican postmasters has begun, about two hundred were dismissed in a single day last week.

At the St. Louis election yesterday, the whole Republican ticket was elected. In other words, the "Pull" knocked out the "Push."

GOV. STONE last week appointed Dr. J. N. Holmes, editor of the Piedmont Banner, to be penitentiary physician. We congratulate our Piedmont brother on his preferment.

THE appointment of Hon. Richard Dalton as Surveyor of the Port at St. Louis, is demanded by the united Democracy of the entire State. He is certain to be successful.

THE annual meeting of the Missouri State Press Association occurs at Clinton, Mo., June 22d, 23d and 24th. After the convention an excursion will be made to the World's Fair.

THERE is still a great deal of contest over the St. Louis federal offices, and it does not seem to be at all certain as to who will secure the appointment. The changes, it is stated, will be made very shortly, however.

THE Democratic Cabinet officers are "turning the rascals out." They found many men on the pay rolls, who are performing no services for the government. Secretary of Agriculture Morton has been particularly active in this respect.

THE tariff barons have come to the front and made up a purse for Wm. McKinley, to reimburse him for the amount he lost through the perfidy of his friends last winter. The amount subscribed will make the Governor independent for the remainder of his days.

HENRY BLACKMORE, a journeyman carpenter of St. Louis, has been appointed Labor Commissioner to succeed W. C. Hall. Blackmore is a well-known man in labor circles, and Gov. Stone seems to have exercised good judgment in making the appointment.

THE Post-Dispatch last Sunday gave an expose of the A. P. A. The oath to be taken to become a member of that society appertains to an era of ignorance, bigotry and barbarism, and how any civilized being can swallow it, is beyond the ordinary ken. Let the A. P. A. emigrate to Africa or Patagonia.

R. W. DENHOLM has commenced the publication of the Press at De Soto, Mo. The Press is a tri-weekly publication and seems to have plenty of local news. While Jefferson county already seems to be pretty well supplied with newspapers, still we wish the new candidate all the success it merits.

JAMES B. WADDILL, of Kansas City, has been appointed Insurance Commissioner by Gov. Stone. Mr. A. C. Van Wormer, of Howell county, who has been deputy commissioner for the past four years, was an applicant for the place, and his failure to secure the office was quite a disappointment to the gentleman's many friends.

It is stated that a certain well-known "statesman" in Southeast Missouri and prospective candidate for Congress from this district, has, within the past few months signed every office-seeker's petition presented to him, in some cases endorsing four different men for the same office. "Joey is sly, devilish sly," but he'd better "look a leedle out!"

**Sectional Loyalty.**

There is to be a meeting of governors of the southern States at Richmond next May to discuss the resources of their section and to suggest some practical method of inducing immigration.

In alluding to the approval of the project by the governor of West Virginia, the Richmond Dispatch says:

The average West Virginian is as loyal to the south as are his brethren of old Virginia, and we are always glad to see any movement anywhere which recognizes the fact that West Virginia is a southern State.

We keep alive the war-worn platitudes about loyalty to the South? What has it to do with the objects for which the governors are to meet? They want to make known the resources of the south and to secure capital and immigrations for developing them. Can those objects be helped by appealing to sectional prejudices and sectional loyalty?

The north is sending millions of dollars every year to develop the vast resources of the Appalachian region of Virginia, Tennessee, North Carolina and Alabama. Northern capitalists, mechanics and farmers are making their homes there. Are not they quite as "loyal" to the south as the governor of West Virginia or any other governor?

To raise the issue of loyalty under such conditions is not only in bad taste—it is wrong in principle and in policy. —Jefferson City Tribune.


