

The Bankers and the People.

The Post-Dispatch has repeatedly asserted, without any intention of being invidious, but simply as honest recognition of a fact, that the bankers do not and cannot represent the people.

This statement has been questioned in letters to the Post-Dispatch wherein it has been urged that the contact of bankers with the people gives them exceptional opportunities to learn their sentiments and determine the best methods of promoting their interests. But the correctness of the Post-Dispatch's view is demonstrated by the action of the Missouri Bankers' Association at Jefferson City.

Bankers from every part of the State were in attendance at the convention. The small towns as well as the large cities were represented, yet the Association adopted a resolution on the money question which is utterly opposed to the opinion of a large majority of the people of the State, irrespective of party affiliations. It declared against the free and unlimited coinage of silver and specifically in favor of the present gold standard. It demanded the maintenance of the present standard of value with silver used only as token money and redeemable in gold. In short, the Association endorsed the gold standard with credit money issued on it by corporation.

The Association's platform is opposed by four-fifths of the people of Missouri and the bankers who adopted it know this to be a fact. There is not a banker in the State who, if he would tell the truth, would not admit that it is opposed to the wishes, sentiments, convictions and interests of the people.

This was so at Memphis. It was so at Jefferson City. It will always be so at meetings of a class held to consider ways and means to promote its special interests. They have no relation to the people's wishes, the people's sentiments or the people's interests.—Post-Dispatch.

Federal Authority.

The imprisonment of Eugene Debs, leader of the last great railroad strike, by order of the federal courts is not so much a calamity to labor as certain agitators would have the public believe. Men like Debs who order senseless strikes and throw thousands of men out of work and paralyze the business of the country are not true friends of labor, and it is well enough that a way has been discovered of reaching them. But the readiness with which the federal courts have punished Debs is a reminder of the fact that these same courts have never exerted themselves to punish officials of great corporations who violate the law whenever it is their interests to do so. If the same energy was displayed in bringing the corporations to justice that is manifested in arresting and punishing lawless strikers, the federal courts would be more popular than they are. For some reason the opinion is growing that the federal courts are largely run in the interest of the corporations and bondholders, and when it comes to a contest between the people and the former, the people always get the worst of it. And this opinion is not altogether unsupported by facts.—Jefferson City Tribune.


