IRONTON, MO., March 14, 1896. Pursuant to notice, the Democratic Executive Committee of Iron County this day met at the courthouse in Ironton, at 3 o'clock p. m., a quorum being present.

The chairman explained the objects of the meeting to be the calling of a mass meeting of Democrats to choose delegates to the Sedalia Convention, which Convention in its turn will select the delegates to represent the State of Missouri in the National Democratic Convention at Chicago.

On motion, it was decided that a Mass Meeting of Democrats of Iron County be called to meet at the courthouse in Ironton, on Saturday, April 11th, 1896, for the purpose above mentioned; and, also, to choose an Executive Committee to serve the ensuing two years.
