Facts And Logic.
 Mr. Bryan's opponents will find it difficult to answer to the satisfaction of the plain people of this country who cherish American principles, institutions and traditions, the masterful argument against imperialism presented in his Indianapolis speech.
 In order to overthrow Mr. Bryan's argument it will be necessary to refute the reasoning of the great men who founded and built American institutions and to overthrow the fabric upon which our free government rests.
 In order to meet the indictment Mr. Bryan presented against the McKinley administration it will be necessary to wipe out the record of the past two years.
 Those who accuse Mr. Bryan of being a mere juggler of words are silenced by this speech, which combines facts with logic in a manner so clear, eloquent and convincing that the simplest mind can comprehend and the ablest must admire the intellectual power of the orator. Mr. Bryan demonstrated his thorough grasp of the subject, his understanding of the principles involved, and his capacity to deal with them as a statesman.
 In his presentation of the subject, Mr. Bryan showed that he could rise above the mere politician and deal with a great national problem in the heat of the campaign in the lofty spirit of a patriotic statesmanship. Without abuse or bitterness, he successfully attacked the policy of his opponent and clearly expounded the policy which he and his party propose to set up against it. No man after reading the speech can say that he does not know what Mr. Bryan, if elected, will do. His program is clearly defined. It must appeal strongly to the masses of the people who are not dazzled by the glittering temptations of the policy of greed and glory.
 It is evident that the speech has made a profound effect on the independent press and people of the country. That effect will grow. It must grow. An appeal of such strength, founded on facts and buttressed with logic, as that embodied in Mr. Bryan's utterance, must claim the earnest thought of the American people.—St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

Broadening The Empire
 It fell out when Mr. McKinley's agents were in Paris, dickering with a whipped and helpless old-world monarchy for the purchase of the Philippines, that Messrs. Day, Reid, Davis & Co. were so fearful lest the imperialistic covetousness of the president would not be sated with a quit claim deed to every foot of ground claimed by Spain in Asia, that they spread out their lines of latitude and longitude to take in such a tremendous scope of that section of the earth as would allow no insular yard of Spain's possessions to escape.
 After the treaty was signed, however, it was discovered by the wide-awake Spanish government that two islands, Sibutu and Cagayan, long, sterile coral reefs, built after the architecture of Wake and Guam, were lying outside the boundary lines laid down with so much precision by the builders of the treaty of Paris.
 As soon as the discovery was made Spain saw a chance for "swelling" the \$20,000,000 so generously paid her by our imperialistic administration out of the treasury, and began to spread the report industriously that Germany was longing desperately to buy those two overlooked islands for coaling stations for her navy.
 The major took the bait. It leaked out from Madrid a few days ago that the president and his cabinet have practically bargained to pay Spain \$100,000 for Cagayan and Sibutu. This news was subsequently confirmed from Washington. Thus it will be seen that the United States has been burdened with two additional slabs of trouble, while to Spain the transaction has been like finding a fat pocketbook in the road.
 Another piece of information, which adds a new halo of beauty to this latest performance of imperialism, is that Mr. McKinley's good friend and brother, Hadji Mohamed Kiram, sultan of Sulu, claims "sovereignty" over the new insular purchases, and the care they will entail may cause him to demand a "raise" in his salary. This

would seem to imply that a fresh batch of slaves and polygamous wives have been added to "the empire."—Kansas City Times.

"Apathy" is Good.
 Senator Hanna is not alone in his discovery of the fact that a condition of apathy, as regards the popular response to the declaration of principles contained in the Republican national platform of 1900, prevails in the minds of the people of the West.
 Mr. Hanna is, however, probably unique in ascribing this apathy to Republican overconfidence. These persons of whom he speaks are at the present time, he says, "so filled with confidence that they fail to enthuse." There is reason to suspect that, deep down in his heart, Mr. Hanna is a bit distrustful of this sort of "confidence." It's so demurely like indifference, don't you know.
 Another fact, also, which the shrewd Hanna has in all likelihood seen as clearly as the next man is this: the apathy toward the Republican platform and candidates has an accompanying feature a marked drift away from the Republican party of elements which have heretofore been peculiarly faithful. In New England there is a notable proportion of voters of the old American stock who refuse to subscribe to the new Republican doctrine of Empire which means the repudiation and final overthrow of the Republic. In the Middle West and Northwest the German-Americans are equally opposed to the policy of imperialism and militarism. And among what the trust plutocrats call "the common people" there is a very sturdy and determined trend of sentiment against the party which stands for the trusts and which does their bidding at the people's expense.
 Chairman Hanna of the Republican National Committee should prepare for the shock of learning in November that the apathy which he already sees was not the apathy of Republican overconfidence, but of popular dissent from the new and un-American doctrines of Republicanism. It is based on distrust and will speedily develop into open and widespread defection. The promise now is that there will be no "general apathy" manifested on November 6, but a tremendous Democratic enthusiasm instead, under which Mr. Hanna, his creature, McKinley, and the imperial trusts will go down in defeat.—St. Louis Republic.

Flory's Start in Life.
 Missouri Democrat.
 Colonel Joe Flory is busily engaged these days distributing his cards over the State. It may not be out of place to explain something about the Colonel's political card. On one side it bears the legend: "Joseph Flory for Governor, the Laboring Man's Friend. See his start in Life on Other Side." As the anxious recipient of this card

turns it over he sees the picture of five section men standing beside a hand-car, and a bare-footed boy with a bucket in one hand and a dipper in the other, which he is passing to one of the section men.

By examining the card carefully one will observe a stream of water on the right and a two-story house in the distance on the left. The stream of water is the Missouri river and the house is the supply depot of the Wm. J. Lemp brewing establishment at Jefferson City, Mo. Let not the gullible public be deceived into the belief that the boy in the picture is Colonel Flory. The latter when a bare-footed boy, lived in Indiana. The picture was taken at Jefferson City by Carl Deeg, a local photographer, and the section men belong to one of the Missouri Pacific gang.
