The New York Tribune, in an effort to defend the riotous extravagance of congress, says: "We are committed to politics, involving expenditures undreamed of under Cleveland and Harrison." Laboring men are take great interest in the supreme court's decision on the "fellow servant" law, and it is generally conceded that the decision removes about the last safeguard the employe of a corporation had. The case was one wherein a locomotive fireman was hurt in an accident caused by the negligence or ignorance of a telegraph operator. The operator made an error in reporting to the dispatcher and the dispatcher gave a train order resulting in a wreck. The injured fireman sued for dam-

ages, but the supreme court finally held that the corporation was not liable for damages sustained by the act of a fellow servant. This decision, singularly enough, was made by a majority of five to four, just as quite a number of recent decisions have been made.—The Commoner.
