Letter From Arkansas.

CLIO, ARK., July 16, 1905. Ed. Register:—Yesterday's Memphis Commercial-Appeal has a strong wall because many millions of dollars are annually taken from the South by Northern stock and insurance companies. Here is what it says in part, after quoting from the Richmond, Va., Times-Dispatch: "Nearly \$30,000,000 of annual tribute for the benefit of strangers; not quite one-tenth of this sum to home institutions."

The fact that this sum goes out of the South annually seems to worry these worthy journals more than the fact that it goes out of the pockets of its rightful owners. If this enormous sum, paid annually to non-residents, were paid to residents of the Southern States, all would be well. No harm to rob the producers of wealth if you don't live too far away. Under co-operation this sum would not only be saved to the South, but it would be saved to those who shed their perspiration to create it.

In the Commoner of last week I find a very interesting speech from Wm. M. Maupin, from which I cull the following: "This is indeed the land of big things. We have the largest area of country dedicated to human freedom in all the wide universe. We have the most beautiful flag, whether viewed from the artistic or the sentimental standpoint. We have the handsomest women, the strongest men, the best beloved children, the fastest horses, the best poker players and the greatest swindlers. We have the longest rivers and the widest chasms between the classes (the italics are mine). A big country? The biggest on earth! The biggest trusts and the biggest bunch of suckers that ever had an opportunity to stand for their rights and never had sense enough to do it."

I wish your readers could see the whole speech, but it is too long to make a part of this letter.

I was pained to read of the attempted lynching of the Spaughs, as that will probably lighten their punishment when they do face a jury. But aside from this fact, such things are to be deplored. Folk's Armed Invasion.

Without warrant at law, without authority of any kind, some fifty or sixty police officers of the city of St. Louis invaded the neighboring county, Saturday. It was a dangerous proceeding. When these men crossed the county line they quit being officers of the law and, as each carried a concealed weapon, they became criminals. Had they attempted force in invading the premises of the Delmar jockey club they could have been killed, without the parties doing the killing breaking the law in the least. This according to the decision of no less a tribunal than the United States supreme court.

In ordering the St. Louis police to invade the county, Gov. Folk claims he is acting under the provisions of section 14 of the scheme of separation and reorganization of the city of St. Louis. Folk, in all probability, knows full well that he is doing nothing of the sort. The language of that section is too plain to allow of any such interpretation as that placed upon it by the governor. It reads: "The metropolitan police of the city of St. Louis shall have the same power and jurisdiction in the county of St. Louis, as constituted by this scheme, as now provided by law; provided that upon a petition of the county court of St. Louis county, the board of police commissioners shall appoint and equip

not more than twenty policemen, as provided in the act approved March 13, 1867, for duty in said county. The cost of equipping and maintaining said police shall be paid by the county as herein established."

No one, even a Tennessee lawyer, will contend that this gives the city police any authority to act in the county except on petition of the county court and then not more than twenty officers may be sent. The county court of St. Louis county has made no petition to the board of police commissioners as Joe Folk knows full well. President Alonzo Chase Stewart of the police board—an appointee of Gov. Folk—recently informed the governor that the St. Louis police, by virtue of the provisions of the section quoted, have no authority to make arrests in St. Louis county unless requested to do so by the county court. Folk's action of Saturday in ordering the St. Louis police to enter the county was deliberate lawlessness. If the legislature does its duty in the premises Folk's impeachment will follow at the earliest opportunity. —St. Louis World.

Perhaps the most interesting statement with respect to the Panama canal was made by J. D. Yeomans in a newspaper interview at Sioux City, Iowa. Mr. Yeomans served for many years on the interstate commerce commission. He said: "The Panama canal is the biggest humbug of the age. I have no hesitancy in saying that in my opinion there will never be a canal built there. No important American engineer, who was not paid for it, ever hazarded the opinion that there would be a canal there. The last monthly report of work done shows that it will take 110 years to finish it. The weeds grow in one end faster than they carry the dirt out of the other. No engineer has ever found a rock or a clay bed in that celebrated Culebra cut, where the United States has done the most of its work. There has been a cut of 350 feet there, and thirty inches of rain falls in thirty hours down those banks. Does anyone suppose that the alluvial soil won't wash down in there to make a mud canal too thick for a government dredge boat to keep afloat in?"

Friday ex-Secretary of State Sam B. Cook filed suit in the Circuit Court against the Pulitzer Publishing Company (St. Louis Post-Dispatch) for \$100,000, the result of an editorial in that paper of June 28th, under the caption, "It is a political junkshop," which reflects discredit on Mr. Cook's official honesty in the management of the Salmon Bank affairs. Messrs. Silver & Brown are attorneys for Mr. Cook. We publish an extract from the article published in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch of June 28th, on which Mr. Cook bases his complaint. It reads as follows: "Upon the authority of those having in charge the examination of the Salmon Bank at Clinton the bank has been insolvent since November, 1903, when George Casey failed. Why was not the bank closed at that time? Major Harvey Salmon was a member of the Democratic State Central Committee, and the intimate political friend of the machine leaders of the Democratic party. The bank's books were examined just before the ex-Secretary of State Cook went out of office, but no action was taken and

the bank was left open to take the money of the unsuspecting depositors. Is the damaging derelict a part of the political junk of the old Democratic machine?" —Jefferson City Tribune.


