A Letter From Texas.

PENIEL, TEX., May 18, 1906.

Ed. Register:—A few words from the sunny south may not be out of place, and should the items find a place in your columns, they will no doubt be of some interest to the many readers. We now have our home in Peniel, Hunt county, Tex. This is a fine country, the land being black and rolling prairie; is worth from sixty to one hundred dollars per acre. The principal crops are cotton and corn. Considerable hay is raised, alfalfa doing well here. This has been a great country for rain the last five months, but this is not usually the case. This is a muddy place when it rains, but when it is dry I never saw a prettier place. People of the south have somewhat different ways to what northern people have, but if anything they are more friendly.

Peniel is a college town. This school is in its seventh year and had an enrollment of 400 this year. They have been building a new brick school building which is nearing completion. The school is expected to be better next year than it has ever been. The town is seven years old, has 500 or 600 inhabitants and is incorporated; is free from whiskey and tobacco—neither allowed to be sold. The society is strictly religious and morals could not be beaten anywhere. Any one desiring to send their children away to school can never find a safer place than this. The place seems very healthy; in the six months we have been here only two deaths have occurred—one from old age and the other an young infant. We had a small-pox scare; in fact, the town was put under quarantine for fifteen or twenty days. Had one genuine case and three or four doubtful ones. The quarantine has been raised and all danger abated. The result of the smallpox in my family is a terribly sore arm.

We have had a cool spring, be-

ing able to sleep under a quilt and blanket every night. Can't see that the heat is any more excessive than in Missouri. We like it here fine; have a nice town, a nice home and a fine little business. We are making a nice living and living easier than ever in life. We feel well bodily and in our souls.

Queue Work at Washington.

The appointment of Assistant Secretary Barnes to be postmaster at Washington is not popular among the "old inhabitants." The Washington Star, usually found on the side of the administration, prints this editorial: "The carnival of crime continues in the District. Last night the wife of a policeman was robbed while passing through Rock Creek Park. This assault took long chances, for the woman was armed, but her aim was poor. This morning an Agacostia woman on returning home from market was grappled by a robber in her own house and robbed of a considerable sum of money. No arrests have yet been made in these cases. Meanwhile thirty-eight policemen remain on duty at the White House. And the major and superintendent of police and the remnants of his force are still engaged in scouring the city and country for evidence with which to blacken the character of Mrs. Minor Morris, in order that the President's assistant secretary may be whitewashed and railroaded into office as the postmaster of Washington. The situation is altogether significant."
