Distinction Without a Difference.

CLIO, ARK., June 7, 1906.

Ed. Register:—You call the article of Wm. Vincent Byars a clear distinction between Democracy and Socialism. It seems to me a distinction without a difference. "No government," he says "should control the person of the earner, nor should he be allowed to accomplish the same end by controlling either the avenues of his employment or the savings he may accumulate of property from his earnings." Is any private individual, with only his own selfish interests to consult, better fitted to control the person of the "earner" than the public of which the "earner" is a part?

The capitalist not only controls the product of the "earner," but his very life, without giving the "earner" any vote as to its disposition. Bulletin No. 150 of the last census says the "earner" earns on an average, in round numbers, \$2500 yearly, and receives in wages therefrom \$500; so you see the capitalist not only controls four-fifths of the earnings of the "earner," but appropriates it to his own use through the laws that the capitalist has made and interpreted for his own benefit. And now when the "earner," the real "earner," the man who digs and delves, wishes by co-operation to get along "pretty well I thank you" without the services of the capitalist, Mr. Byars becomes frightened for fear that the "earner" will become tyrannical if allowed to direct the distribution of his own earnings.

Under Socialism the "earners" (thanks to Mr. Byars for that word) will collectively control their own earnings, which will be democracy in industry, and only "earners" will have any vote as to distribution of earnings. "He that will not work neither let him eat" will then become a fact instead of a precept.

Socialism does not contemplate

the abolition of private property, but of private capital, which means that which must be used in the production of property. Property so used becomes capital, and the ownership of it enables the owner to dictate the terms on which it may be used by those who must use it or die. And when all the capital of the country is gathered in the hands of a few, it gives that few power over the lives of those who must use capital, and that means all the wage workers.

The writer hereof knows something of this power. He felt it in 1896, when the owners of the capital were denying its use to the "earners" unless they agreed to vote a certain way. I didn't know the remedy then for that degrading condition, but I know it now; hence I am a Socialist.

A Change in Sentiment.

"Who thought that Mr. Bryan's trip around the world would end in a triumph?" says the Kansas City Post. How then can he be the one to cement the factions of his party and bring back a reign of harmony?"

"To those who have watched the attitude of Mr. Bryan and the trend of events in this country in recent years the above question

appears an easy one. The facts of the matter are that Mr. Bryan comes more nearly representing all the factions of the Democratic party at the present time than any man living. As far as the Missouri Democrats are concerned their declaration in his behalf was not a cause for surprise. This has always been a Bryan State. But what has caused the more conservative wing of the party to change front and come out openly for the Nebraskan?

"All the world admire a man who is honest and has principles and convictions to which he adheres in victory or defeat. Mr. Bryan has held some radical views during his campaigns and has made some sweeping charges, but no one has ever accused him of dishonesty or of wavering in his convictions. Time is the great vindicator, and those who have assailed him have found that their hostility has reacted upon themselves.

"The revelations of scandal and graft in the railroad, insurance and packing concerns have startled the whole country, but they have proven the truth of Mr. Bryan's assertions made during two campaigns for the presidency. And they reveal the wisdom of the man in judging men and conditions. A prophet could have done no better."
