## REPUBLICAN EFFORTS AT "TRUST BUSTING" FARUCIAL.

Great Combines Care Little for the Imposition of a Fin., and the Party in Power Dares Not Push Them Farther.

The Republican plan of trust busting is so ineffectual that it would seem to have been carried out entirely for political effect. What good result has been accomplished by the great and successful effort of Attorney General Knox to defeat the merger of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroads? Those corporations are still non-competing and are controlled by the same interests and are continuing to charge "all the traffic will bear."

The same great trust and corporation lawyer, now Senator Knox, has again been called into consultation with the official trust busters, to advise them how to prosecute the Standard Oil trust. Suppose the effort is successful, and the trust is convicted of restraint of trade, and the court of last resort should decide that the corporation is an illegal combination, would such a decision prevent the Rockefeller and their partners from continuing to charge their own price for oil and gasoline, and would any punishment but a comparatively limited fine be meted out to the offending corporation. Rockefeller and his partners would pay their share of the fine, but still continue to plunder the oil consumers and the independent oil purchasers and probably pay the fine by adding to the price of oil and decreasing the price of the crude oil they buy.

Even the conservatively New York Evening Post contends that this Republican plan of trust busting is a farce, for it is very limited recourse for present evils in mulcting those fictitious and fabulously wealthy personalities we call trusts. We note that Jack the Giant Killer struck not at the pockets, but at the necks, of his foes. The sins of corporations can always be definitely located at the head, and when we see a few high financial heads wearing a prison cut we shall be within hailing distance of real reform. We may at last rejoice heartily at the good beginning the law has made with the Standard Oil company. If it is not so difficult to fine its legal entity, there is probably some way also of getting at the real conspirators behind the charter.

But will the administration force the fighting against the trusts and corporations far enough to get at "the real conspirators?" When Rockefeller, or Rogers, or some other trust magnate, has been convicted and in jail will be time enough for President Roosevelt and the Republicans to claim they are the real trust busters.

### Repaying the Bankers.

The Roosevelt administration is paying back the national bankers for their liberal contributions to the Republican campaign funds by loaning them the public funds to the amount of over \$150,000,000 to carry on their business, without charging them any interest. But in addition to that there have been special loans made to favored Wall street bankers to enable them to import gold and thus try and prevent a Wall street panic. It is not strange therefore that Mr. Haden, an Atlanta banker, demands that the southern banks be loaned the public money to move the cotton crop. "Why," Mr. Haden asks, when addressing a convention of national bankers, "should we not call upon the government for aid as do the gambling-stricken banks when pressed by frenzied speculation?"

The answer should be plain, that it is entirely out of the province of government to place the public funds at the disposal of any private business enterprise, for if one is aided all others would have equal right to the same treatment, and even the government of the United States would have money enough to go around. Secretary Shaw loaning money to the favored Wall street banks is a usurpation of his powers that congress should investigate.

### Must Make Good Its Boast.

Mr. Shonts is getting as changeable as his noble master. First, the West Indian darcyks were to make the dirt fly at Panama; then Chinese were to be imported to do the trick; next the work was to be let by contract, so that the administration would not be blamed for employing Chinese labor. The latest is a declaration of Chairman Shonts that no Chinese have been engaged or will be engaged for work there. Still, someone will have to dig the canal, for we have the assurance in the Republican campaign book that the Republican party "does things," if it does change its mind from week to week.

### Devastating the Forests.

The timber in the United States is melting away like the snow in spring, yet our Republican politicians refuse to abolish the tariff on lumber. To show how suicidal this standpoint policy is, the statisticians declare that there is only now standing in the United States approximately 1,475,000,000 feet of lumber and that 45,000,000,000 feet are being cut every year. It is estimated that enough timber is destroyed by fire or used for other purposes to make the total consumption 75,000,000,000 annually, so that there is not enough timber standing to continue commercially for more than 20 years. And yet with this dearth staring them in the face, the people of the United States continue a policy that prevents them by tariff restrictions from drawing on the timber supply of Canada and other countries.

### Measure Your Ice.



## FOR THE GARDEN.

Kind of Hoes that Will Prove Useful in Cultivating Vegetables.

For general use in the garden I like a business hoe, one that is wide, so as to cut over a large surface or move a good lot of soil at each stroke, and sharp, so as to cut deep and easy. A good file ought to be kept near at hand. But we also want hoes that can be used in weeding and especially in weeding onions grown by the transplanting method. They stand several inches apart and will admit of work-

ing among them with a narrow bladed hoe. I used to take an old, well worn hoe, one practically past its usefulness, and cut the blade down at both sides, so as to leave it from corner to corner only two or two and one-half inches wide, and the corners themselves at an acute angle, says a writer in Farm and Fireside. As to the new style hoe, it is surely sharp and I believe of just the right form to be serviceable for use as a weeder in onions and other close planted stuff. In short, with hoes of the right kind it seems to be not much of a curse to be "the man with the hoe."

### INITIATIVE IN FARMING.

It is the Ability to Originate New Methods.

What is called "initiative" is the ability to begin a new thing without that new thing being suggested by the example or the words of another. Few people comparatively have this power of initiative. The ones that have it are the ones that lead in new enterprises. The faculty is acquired by study and by using methods to get the mind out of the ruts. Initiative is needed on the farm as well as elsewhere. It is a difficult thing for a farmer to begin an entirely new process, yet the beginning of a new process in farming is often revolutionary in its effects. Because men find it so difficult to originate new thoughts is the reason why the development of the race has been slow up to the last hundred years, in which time this quality of the mind has been greatly stimulated. Perhaps this has in itself been due to imitation, the world desiring to imitate the men that have made great successes by initiating new things. In the domain of farming, says Farmers' Review, we have had the illustrious example of such men as have brought to light the presence of the tubercle of the leguminous plants, and those that have shown the way to raise sub-tropical plants in our northern climate. Initiative in farming will yet give us new processes, of which our minds have not yet formed a conception.

### COWPEAS FOR LAWNS.

Grown and Plowed Under They Help Get Good Stand of Grass.

The great value of cowpeas as a nitrogen gatherer and natural fertilizer has long been known. Their importance in making lawns should be better understood. Under the most favorable conditions it is quite a serious task to get a lawn well started. The usual result of digging the cellar and grading the lawn is that the good soil is removed or covered with sub-soil. Cowpeas will mellow such soil and put fertility into it sooner and more effectively than any other plant. In the South cowpeas are extensively used for this purpose. In the villages and small cities one sees a crop of cowpeas in front of the new houses everywhere. Usually one crop is enough to prepare the soil for lawn grasses, but on very poor soil two crops may be required. The soil is thereby put into the right physical condition, nitrogen and humus are added and weeds are choked out completely.

### Fusarium Roseum.

The above is the pretentious name of a little mold growing on rye some seasons when the weather is damp at about the time the rye is ready for harvest. The spores of the fungus are spread by the wind, by rain and by insects. A Russian scientist has been experimenting with the fungus to discover if it is poisonous and finds that it is. He was led to undertake the study of the mold by the fact that in 1903 in Russia many people were poisoned, some of them fatally, by eating rye bread that had been made from rye having this fungus. It is safest not to use for human food rye that has anything of this character upon it, though it would probably require considerable quantities of the infected grain to produce fatal results.

### Breed for Size.

The shepherd should breed for size, weight of fleece, evenness of distribution over the body, for length of staple and fineness, for vigor, healthfulness and constitution, and as a result, he will soon have a flock of large, thrifty sheep, which yield him each season fleeces of the highest merit.

### Treatment of Habitual Criminals.

The New Zealand minister for justice has introduced the habitual criminals and offenders bill, which provides that where a person has been twice convicted of a criminal assault or four times of wounding, robbery or burglary, he may be regarded as an habitual criminal and at the expiration of his sentence detained in a reformatory. After six convictions for vagrancy a man may be treated in the same way. Discharge from the reformatory will be secured only on the recommendation of the court, while the detained offenders will be made to work and wages will be placed to their credit or toward the support of their dependents.

### His Monument.

There has been set in a cemetery in Orwell, Oswego county, N. Y., as the memorial of a lumberman, framed of granite and marble, the exact reproduction in miniature of a sawmill in the town of Redfield, which was owned by the deceased. On the scale of an inch to the foot, the mill is complete in every detail, being provided with saws, carriages, rollers to carry off the sawed lumber, skids with three logs placed thereon ready to roll on the carriage car, which is loaded with lumber.
