Perhaps, however, they do not make good Machinists, which latter qualification is a *sine qua non* with our solar walking Governor.

THE *Scott County Kicker* admits that it printed the proposed constitutional amendments last fall and accepted the full legal rate in pay therefor, which proves our statement of a couple of weeks since, that the *Kicker* doesn't believe in legal rates only when the other fellow gets them. And the *Kicker* must be more careful in its assertion of fact. For instance, it says that the REGISTER received legal rates for the publication of the ballot in 1892. This is not true. Our charge for the ballot publication that year was but a trifle more than fifty per cent. of the rate prescribed by law. In conclusion we have but one favor to ask Bro. Hafner. When you seek to discuss a public question with the REGISTER, kindly refrain from quoting the Prince of Liars to substantiate anything you may want to say. That only makes you ridiculous.
