An Appeal to the People.

The sole object of these articles is to strengthen the temperance sentiment throughout the county and to prevent the opening of saloons anywhere within its borders.

They are not written to please any man or any political party, and, though it may seem strange, they are not written to please even myself.

Many seem indifferent, want to quit with complete victory in sight. A certain work ought to be done; an emergency has arisen in the face of which having confidence in the people I am compelled to write from a profound conviction of duty.

I have frequently said so that all might hear: "The liquor traffic is prejudicial to public health and public morals and the people of this community are tired and disgusted with the whole miserable business."

A united public opinion is now demanding that saloons be forever done away with. The people are sovereign and will do right when they understand what is right."

I shall trust the good people—men and women—of this county to stand like a wall of adamant against this Monster Iniquity of the ages, the saloon. This is the people's cause and the temperance element is now insisting on fair treatment and I use this term calmly with no ill feeling whatever.

This public opinion, powerful enough to make any man, party or creed hesitate to oppose it; this principle of fairness must have been full grasped by our County Court when, immediately following our Local Option election, they met and issued an order that hereafter a two-thirds majority and twelve hundred dollars shall be required to secure license to run a saloon.

Action was unanimous, not one dissenting word spoken. I want to be quoted as saying that action at that time is greatly to their credit, highly commendable and easily defensible.
