not sending him at once to the osteopath.  
But is William just?

In accusing the old school doctor of fraud William is doubly unfair, as that doctor despises the osteopath and honestly believes him a quack. And we all know how easy it is to believe what is most desirable.

William argues, however, the success of osteopathy now being common knowledge, that when he pays a doctor for advice the doctor should give whatever advice is most likely to lead to a cure.

The doctor might argue that he gave William what William paid for, the best treatment he knew how to give.

### Old Mexico.

As we had seen about all there was to see we are on our way again, to San Louis Potosi. The country is barren mountains and rich valleys alternating. This is a city of 80,000, with several railroads and is the capital of the state of the same name. The city is very rich, derived from the silver and gold mines near by. The mines have been worked for three hundred years, minting about three million dollars a year. There is a clock in the Cathedral presented by the king of Spain many years ago, in return for which he was given the largest piece of silver ever mined.

We visited the church of Guadeloupe El Carmen, Bishop's Palace, the Mint, Military Barracks, and Penitentiary.  
We now take a side trip to Tampico, on the Gulf of Mexico at the mouth of the Rio Panneo, which is navigable for two hundred miles for steamboats. They have a jetty at the mouth of the river to deepen the channel. In the bay is the finest tarpon fishing in the world. I caught one that weighed 70 pounds, and I was all in when the thing was landed.

We are now in the hot country and it has the right name for the temperature stood at 100. My clothing was too heavy for the place, so I bought me a linen suit for \$5 and got along very well. There is a fine harbor here for the largest ships. Cortez first landed in Mexico at this place, in 1570, and took possession of the country in the name of Spain. After seeing about all there was to see, and taking a sail and sea bath, we returned to San Louis and resumed our journey south to Queretaro. This is the town where Maximilian made his last stand and lost. He escaped to Cerro De Les Camparias where he was captured, with his two Generals, Miramon and Mejia, tried, condemned, and all three shot. The place of their execution is marked by a Chapel and in the Chapel are three Tablets to their memory, which all visitors wish to see. When one visits this scene it is with a sense of sadness, for you remember poor Carlotta, the Emperor's wife, and their sad ending, which tragic event sent her to the madhouse.

As we have seen all the sights here we are on our way again to Mexico City, the nation's capital, where we arrived at 7:50 P. M. After a good night's rest in a Mexican hotel, which is not so bad, we hunt up our Consul-General, Mr. Shanklin, whom we find to be as pleasant as one could wish. After he had read our letter from Judges Dyer and Reynolds, he informed me that there was nothing too good for one of Col. Pat's friends, as he knew him quite well. After a half hour's talk, he gave me passes to visit Chepultapac Castle, President Diaz's Summer Home, the National Palace, (similar to our White House), the Military Academy, (their West Point), the National Museum, and the Federal Prison. All these require a pass and must be visited on certain days and at certain hours. All the other places of interest can be visited without a pass and permission of the owners. Of course our first visit was to the historic Castle of Chepultapac. It is on a bluff 200 feet high which rises out of the plain, and almost in the heart of the city, surrounded by a beautiful park with immense trees, driveways, fountains and fine springs, with a zoo. This bluff is about one-fourth mile long and two hundred yards across, the whole top surface occupied by the Castle and Military School. On presenting our pass, a cadet took charge of us and conducted us through all of the rooms, flower garden, military school and out on top, where the grandest view is had in the world. All the city is in plain view, the lakes and old Popocatepetl and another extinct volcano, that no one can pronounce but a Mexican. After we came down we were shown the cannon ball shells that are yet sticking in the wall which the Americans shot at them at the battle of September 12th and 13th, 1847. On the latter date the castle surrendered. They tell you that 9000 cannon shots were fired before the surrender and that the castle was defended by 350 soldiers, which story is to be taken with some salt. The two battles that were fought previous to and lead-

### Order of Publication

In the circuit court of Iron County, Missouri, November 10, 1909.

The State of Missouri, at the relation and to the use of J. N. Lewis, collector of the revenue of Iron County, Missouri, against

John W. Usher, Dr. B. H. Zwart, Albert J. Zwart, Mrs. Rene M. Reese, Joseph A. Zwart, John B. Pratt, the unknown heirs and devisees of John B. Pratt, deceased, E. M. Donoho, the unknown heirs and devisees of E. M. Donoho, deceased, John I. Marshall, Sheriff Iron County, Mo., trustee, Jeff Rains, A. Buford, the unknown heirs and devisees of A. Buford, deceased.

(Action to enforce lien for taxes.)

Now at this day comes the plaintiff, J. N. Lewis, collector of the revenue of Iron County, Missouri, and shows by the return of the Sheriff on the summons heretofore issued to Iron County, Missouri, that the defendant, John W. Usher, cannot be found in the said Iron County, Missouri, and the court being satisfied that process cannot be served upon said defendant, and, therefore, cannot be summoned in this action by the ordinary process of law in this state; it is, therefore, ordered by the judge of this court that publication be made notifying said defendants that an action has been commenced against them in the circuit court of said county, the object and general nature of which is to enforce the lien of the state of Missouri, on the following real estate, belonging to the said defendants, for back taxes for the years 1904, 1905, 1906 and 1907, to wit:

The south half of lot three of the north-west quarter of section 18, township 23 north, range 3 east, containing 27.99 acres; also, the north half of lot three of the north-west quarter of section 18, township 33 north, range 3 east, containing 27.99 acres in Iron County, Missouri.

(An itemized statement in the nature of a tax bill showing the amount of taxes, interest and costs now due on said real estate for the years aforesaid, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$17.68, is filed with said petition as provided by law.)

And unless they be and appear at the next term of said court, to be held for the county of Iron, and State of Missouri, at the courthouse in said county, on the fourth Monday in April next, (1910), and on or before the third day thereof (if the term shall so long continue; and, if not, then before the end of the term), and plead, answer or demur to said plaintiff's petition, the same will be taken as confessed, judgment rendered in accordance with the prayer of said petition, and said real estate, or so much thereof as may be necessary to satisfy said judgment, interests and costs, be sold under a special fieri facias to be issued thereon.
