THE REGISTER is unqualifiedly and unreservedly for Hon. E. W. Major, our present efficient Attorney General, for the Democratic nomination for Governor. We believe he would prove the strongest candidate the party could name and the indications seem to be very favorable for his success at the August primary.

THESE are certainly riotous times with our Republican friends. The following is taken from a stalwart Republican paper, the Jackson Items:

With the present condition of affairs within the Republican party the defeat of Taft and Sherman is a forgone conclusion. It would be a miracle if this did not come about. Mr. Taft's reelection was exceedingly doubtful four months ago; much more so with the party divided in two camps. Both Taft and Roosevelt have been nominated on separate tickets. That settles the outcome. The divisions did not occur on any of the political questions of the day. As far as they are concerned, both camps adhere to the same general tenets. The second ticket is the nature of an appeal from the decision of the committee and the convention to the highest tribunal in the land—the people. It will be a fight for honesty in politics and against political crooks. With them there can be no compromise or parleying. But the masses of the party, no matter in which camp, are honest, and the ensuing battle should be confined to the sole issue at stake. There is no reason for Republicans to extend the split further.

If things are permitted to drift, not only will the national ticket be affected, but the defeat will extend to the state and county tickets. Many Republicans will not vote; others will refuse to vote their own party tickets. Many have told us so in the past few days. The proper remedy out is for those Republicans in Missouri who believe that the result of the labors of the first convention at Chicago does not represent the will of the majority of the Republicans to get an electoral ticket in the field, and, being Republicans, place the same ticket which will be nominated in the August primary, both state and county, on this new ballot. In other words, let the division be confined solely to the national ticket, which is the issue stake. It can be done.

With the lines of battle drawn within the party, one of the matters to be fought out is general house cleaning. The men guilty of crooked work must be retired and put out. This work of reformation should be carried on within the party. Of prime importance is the selection of committee members. Only men who will agree to act as stewards of the party should be chosen. No autocrats who believe that "anything is fair in politics" should be tolerated.
