ORDINANCE NO. 55. An Ordinance to Submit to the Legal Voters of the City of Ironton a Proposition to Extend the Corporate Limits thereof.

SECTION. 1. Territory proposed. 2. Publication of notice. 3. Form of ballot, sense of voter, how expressed. 4. Ordinance, to take effect, when. Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Ironton as follows: SEC. 1. Territory proposed—That at the regular city election to be held in the City of Ironton on the 1st day of April, 1913, there be submitted to the legal voters of said city, a proposition to extend the corporate limits of said city over certain territories adjacent thereto as follows: Beginning at the corner of sections 31 and 32, township 34, N., Range 4 east of the 6th P. M.; thence north along the section line between said sections, a distance of 825 feet; thence west 820 feet; thence south 825 feet to the township line between townships 33 and 34; thence east along said line 594 feet to the place of beginning, to be designated herein as "Territory No. 1."

Also, beginning at the southwest corner of the east half of Lot 5 of the northwest quarter of section 5, township 34, N., Range 4 east of the 5th P. M., which point is the southeast corner of what is known as the negro cemetery; thence east with the lot line between lots 4 and 5 of the northwest quarter of said section, a distance of 1335 feet to the west side of the Ironton and Arcadia Public Road; thence south along the west boundary line of said road a distance of 324 feet; thence north 88 degrees east 350 feet; thence north 35 degrees east 1295 feet to the east boundary of the St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern Railway right of way; thence north along said east boundary line to the intersection of the township line between townships 33 and 34; thence west along said township line 740 feet to the east side of Block 4 of the East Addition to said City of Ironton; thence south along the east side of Block 34 and 45 of the original town of Ironton; thence west along the south side of Blocks 45, 44, 43, 41, 40 and 39, of said city, to the intersection of the middle line of Lot 5 of the northwest quarter of said section 5; thence south along said line to the place of beginning, to be designated herein as "Territory No. 2."

Also, beginning at the northeast corner of Block 11, of the original town of Ironton; thence south along the east side of Block 11, 13 and 22 of said City of Ironton to the north line of Block 8 of the East Addition thereof; thence east along the north line of Blocks 8 and 7 to the east side of the St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern Railway right of way; thence north and with the east boundary of said right of way to the intersection of the south side of Washington street in said city; thence west with the south line of said street 100 feet, to the place of beginning, to be designated herein as "Territory No. 3."

SECTION 2. Publication of notice—That notice of the submission of said proposition be given by publication of this ordinance one insertion each in the IRON COUNTY REGISTER and the ARCADIA VALLEY ENTERPRISE, two weekly newspapers published in said city, the publication to be at least ten days before the date of the election.

SECTION 3. Form of ballot, sense of voter, how expressed—That the ballots used in voting on said proposition shall have written or printed thereon the following: "To extend the corporate limits over Territory No. 1," YES—NO. "To extend the corporate limits over Territory No. 2," YES—NO. "To extend the corporate limits over Territory No. 3," YES—NO.

Those voting at said election who favor the extension of said corporate limits over said territories, or either of them, shall mark out the word "NO," written or printed opposite the words designating the territory being voted upon, and those opposed to the extension of the corporate limits over said territories, or either of them, shall mark out the word "YES," written or printed opposite the words designating the territory being voted upon.

SECTION 4. Ordinance to take effect, when—This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the date of its passage and approval.

Read three times and passed this, the 17th day of March, 1913.
