### Fine Baptist Meeting on Arcadia Heights.

(From the Wayne County Journal.) Last week the undersigned was in attendance at the circuit court at Greenville. Being dismissed by the honorable court Friday at noon, I hurried away to my home at Piedmont which I reached about dark. Near 2 A. M. Saturday morning I left for Arcadia Heights to attend the Baptist Assembly, which had met on August 6th. There I found a great body of Baptists; and, in fact, some great Baptists. Among them were: Dr. J. P. Greene, president of William Jewell College, and Dr. Evans, of William Jewell, the sweet Welch sweet singer, who ably led the tabernacle singing. Dr. Greene preached four able sermons to the assembly on Baptist doctrine.

Dr. Francis, of Boston, is the Assembly pastor, and oh, how he can delve into the Scriptures! He preached two great sermons each day, and then we met such other great men as Dr. Sam Frank Taylor, pastor at Montgomery City; Dr. W. A. Wilson, president of the Word and Way; Dr. H. E. Truex, of St. Louis, secretary of Home and Foreign Missions, and his brother who is pastor somewhere in western Missouri, and Dr. T. L. West, secretary of State Missions, and Rev. Milford Biggs, of Ironton, president of the Home for Aged Baptists, and Rev. J. T. Wats, of St. Louis, superintendent of Sunday Schools, and Mr. Moore of New York, representing the Northern Board; and then there was John W. Lowe, our missionary to China, who spoke to us of the doctrines he preached to our yellow brethren beyond the great Pacific, and their simple, trusting faith, and of the millions in the walled cities who had not yet heard the "Gospel of Christ, which is the Power of God unto Salvation." And Rader and Lemons and Robertson and numerous other brethren worthy of mention, to say nothing of the noble young men and women and mothers and wives who are great Christians and Sunday school workers. In fact, it is a great thing to meet with the people of God, and there draw nigh to and crouch down in the arms of Our Heavenly Father. The assembly grounds are located on the top of the mountain northeast of Ironton and Arcadia, overlooking the beautiful Arcadia Valley. The scenery is beautiful, indeed, most especially from Sunset Rock and from the top of the William Jewell building. Water is furnished on the grounds by pumping it from the creek with a large engine at Ironton and from a well on the grounds. The crowd was large and orderly; there were about 150 tents on the grounds—a regular city of tents. It is a great place for an outing and everybody seems to enjoy it. Those attending are expected to register, giving their address and their church preference. Up to Sunday 523 had registered. Of this number 409 were Baptists, 12 Congregationalists, 12

### Iron Mountain Demonstration Farm.

A new feature of the Missouri Pacific-Iron Mountain agricultural work is to be held on the land, where practical demonstration can be given of the farm work. On the Iron Mountain demonstration farms the dates selected for these field schools are as follows: Dermott, Ark., August 18th; Hope, Arkansas, August 20; Arcadia, August 27; Mer Rouge, La., August 31, and Conway, Ark., September 2. All these meetings are to be held in the field and present conditions of the crops will be discussed. For instance, the subject of corn growing will be taken up in the corn field and the present condition of the crops and factors, such as seed, preparation of the seed bed, cultivation, weather conditions and the influence of such matters on the crop will be explained. A seed selection demonstration will be a feature. The best stalks and best ears will be selected and discussed and instructions given by demonstration for the improvement of the corn crop by proper selection of seed. In a similar manner, cotton will be taken up and the methods to be used in combating the boll weevil and the life history of this pest will be discussed. The best plants will be selected and seed improvement explained. In cow pea fields the best varieties will be shown, their value as soil improvers explained and their feeding value and place in rotation discussed. Farmers will be asked to take part in these discussions and give the results secured in their fields this year.

### All other crops will be taken up in a similar manner.

Agents of the United States Department of Agriculture and of the farmers themselves will lend their assistance in this matter. On the Iron Mountain Railroad demonstration farm at Hope, Ark., oat land plowed four inches deep yielded but 23 bushels to the acre, while the same land plowed ten inches deep and fertilized yielded 77 bushels to the acre. This increase results from the fact that the deep plowing afforded a better reservoir for soil water, and dry weather did not delay the growth. In the deeper plowing a large supply of moisture came in contact with more soil particles and dissolved more plant food. There was also more space for root development, and the larger root development was enabled to secure more moisture and more plant food.
