Missouri Home for Aged Bap- tists.

DEAR MR. AKE—Though a little tardy in complying with your request to write something for your paper about the Home, nevertheless I take pleasure in doing so. The second annual report will be rendered to the Board of Trustees at their annual meeting which occurs in July. After that meeting, I'll be glad to furnish you items from the report.

In the two years that the Home has been at work, it has cared for thirty-five old people. The highest number in the home at any one time was twenty-two. Of the seven who have died in the Home, five were past eighty years of age, one was almost eighty, and the other past seventy. The old people in the Home come to us upon the application of the churches of which they are members. Six churches in St. Louis are represented, one in Kansas City, and the others here have come from all parts of the state, even Cedar and Vernon counties being represented. One is from Jefferson county, one from Wayne and one from Cape Girardeau. Two of the Home residents are totally blind, two are practically so, and another is totally deaf. Another keeps her bed, and three use wheel chairs when out of bed.

A progressive town, just as an up-to-date business firm, appreciates the value of good advertising. A few hundred thousand people in and around here have had to be told why the Home was located in Ironton. Well, you know the answer, the climatic, scenic and a few other advantages of the Arcadia Valley. The Home has Rev. W. L. Boyer, of St. Louis, giving all the time leaving over the state. Mr. Boyer is a preacher of more than ordinary ability and widely known in religious work throughout Missouri. Miss Komora Cheshire, a highly educated and cultured young woman, gives at least half her time traveling in Northwest Missouri. The work of these two fields is practically all done by the traveling Mrs. Riggs and I do give Ironton considerable advertising. The metropolitan papers and scores of country papers have something to say about Ironton because the Home is here. Besides, there is the Word and Way, of Kansas City, a denominational paper, going into dozens of homes every week, and at least every other issue having something about Ironton and the Home. The little paper published monthly by the Home and edited by myself goes into several thousand homes regularly, going to five hundred post-offices in Missouri, and into nineteen other states and one foreign country. Those who handle the mail at the post-office can tell you that I write several hundred letters a month. Now, if Ironton had not been on the map, the Baptist Home would never put it on, and it will certainly help to keep it there.

In my files I have hundreds of letters from people who want to come to the Home to live and from churches wanting to get members in. More than this, I have communications from people in eleven other states about admission into the Home. This but emphasizes the need of the kind of work the Home is doing. We can take in people only as fast as the charitable inclined people provide the means for their support, for those who come to the Home do not pay their way. If they could do so, they would not be here.

The Home is in no sense a private enterprise or institution, any more than the schools, churches and assemblies of the valley are private institutions. It is a public institution, held in trust by a Board of Trustees for the purpose of caring for de-

pendent, old people who have no means of support. No individual has any financial interest in it, nor will it ever be possible for any one to exploit the Home for private gain. It is strictly a humanitarian work, its sole business being to raise money all over the state of Missouri and spend it in Ironton caring for the aged ones who have no one else to provide for them.

Now, Mr. Editor, if this article is too short you can apply it, but if it is too long, what will you do with it?

Teachers, Clerks and School Boards.

Section 10,933, Revised School Law of Missouri, requires the County Superintendent to hold a meeting of the teachers of the county, prior to the opening of the schools, for the purpose of planning the year's work and explaining the Course of Study, so that young teachers, especially, will be able to begin their work without any loss of time.

This same section says it shall be the duty of the teachers to attend meetings called by the County Superintendent, and perform the duties assigned them. All teachers who are not attending Summer School at the time this meeting is held will be required to attend this meeting.

Teachers who have made sufficient grades to justify the issuing of a certificate will receive same at this meeting, on condition that they are present and faithful in the performance of the duty assigned them. This applies to all who took the examination, whether you have a year or not, if you are expecting to teach in the county this year.

The meeting will be held at the Ironton Public School Building, beginning at 1:15 o'clock p. m., sharp, Thursday, July 8th, 1915. This hour affords ample time for all to get here and not be late. Let us set an example that we would like for our own pupils to follow by being prompt.

It is a great task for a teacher to learn how to teach a school in three days, but if you do your part at this meeting you will be better equipped to perform your duties as a teacher and will be able to give your best to your service. It is through co-operation that we get our best results.

The State Superintendent, or one of his representatives, will be here to explain the use of the Course of Study. If you have any questions on the Course of Study or the school law, have them ready.

The school officers are requested not to begin their schools until after this meeting is held. This is done to give you a chance to become familiar with the Course of Study before you begin teaching.

I have been notified by the State Superintendent that the Course of Study will not be ready for distribution until July 30th; but you have your old Course of Study and I hope you will devote as much time to the study of it as you can between now and the time of meeting. Please bring it with you as you will need it for reference.

If you have not secured a school this will give you a chance to meet the members of the school boards, and will, especially, give them an opportunity to see the teachers who are interested and trying to promote school work. A number of boards have indicated that they much prefer a teacher who is interested in the children and the school work, and works for the advancement of the school, even though his book knowledge is limited, to one who is ever so well educated, but hasn't interest enough in the work to do it.

FIRST. I will hold the Teachers' Meeting on the 8th and 9th of July, and the School Board Convention on July 9th and 10th. This will give the teachers and school officers an opportunity to meet together. This meeting is required by law to be held prior to the opening of schools.

SECOND. It will give districts that want to begin their schools early a chance to begin as early as the second Monday in July.

THIRD. It is the time of year that the District Clerks are closing up their year's work and will afford the new Clerk (if there is to be a change of clerks) an opportunity to understand the duties of his office better.

The President and Clerk of each school district are to be the representatives, but every district is entitled to two representatives, and if the President or Clerk can not be present, it is the duty of the Board to appoint some other member of the Board, or some other person in the district, to represent them at this meeting. Each officer attending such meeting shall receive compensation at the rate of one dollar and fifty cents per day for the days that he is at the meeting, and mileage at the rate of five cents per mile for the number of miles necessary to be traveled in going from the schoolhouse of his district to the place of meeting.

Following is the bill as it passed the General Assembly:

SECTION 1. That it shall be the duty of the County Superintendent of Public Schools to call together once each year at the county seat or some other suitable place in the county, the presidents of the school boards and the clerks of the school districts of the county, for the consideration and discussion of questions pertaining to school administration. Said meeting shall be held on the first Monday of the month of July, and every president of a school board and of every clerk of a school district in the several counties to attend the meeting of school officers called by the county superintendent of public schools for the purpose of considering and discussing questions pertaining to school administration; and each school officer attending such meeting shall receive compensation at the rate of one dollar and fifty cents per diem and mileage at the rate of five cents per mile for the number of miles necessary to be traveled in going from the schoolhouse of his district to the place of meeting, same to be paid out of the public schools of his district: Provided, that no allowance shall be made for more than two days in the school year: Provided, further, that in case of the inability of either the president of the board or clerk of the district to attend such meeting, the school board shall appoint and pay for some other person to represent the district in place of said president of the board or clerk of the district. Upon presentation of a certificate signed by the county superintendent of public schools, the board shall order warrants drawn in favor of the school officers or other representative of the board who attended said meeting in accordance with the provisions of this section.

We have engaged an able speaker to address us on Friday, July 10th. His lecture will be practical and interesting; especially, will it be of interest to the teachers and principals of public schools. This will be the third meeting of the school boards ever held in the county. The other meetings have been good ones. Can't we make this one better? I trust every district will be represented, as it is through the co-operation of all the people that we get the best results. School Boards, it is your duty to come to this meeting and show that you are willing to co-operate with your teacher. Teachers, it is your duty to come, and show that you are willing to co-operate with the patrons of your schools. Don't forget the date.

I further request that no school begin its session until after this meeting is held, and that you, as school officers, see to it that your teacher is present.

SECTION 10,933, S. L., says that it shall be the duty of the teachers to attend meetings called by the County Superintendent, and perform the duties assigned them. All teachers who are not attending Summer School at the time this meeting is held will be required to attend this meeting.

Teachers who have made sufficient grades to justify the issuing of a certificate will receive same at this meeting, on condition that they are present and faithful in the performance of the duty assigned them. This applies to all who took the examination, whether you have a year or not, if you are expecting to teach in the county this year.
