Mr. Roach Replies.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Aug. 19, 1915.
Editor "Globe-Democrat,"
St. Louis, Missouri.

Dear Sir:—Your editorial in today's issue on "State Finances" is a typical illustration of making a misrepresentation by telling but part of the truth.

You quote from the State Treasurer's last biennial report, concerning the affairs of this Department, but you do not quote all that report says on this subject. In order to assume the dignity of metropolitan journalism, state-manship of state-wide proportions would have impelled you to say that the State Treasurer's report, discussing the statement that you quoted, also said:

"It should be borne in mind that in the foregoing receipts (which your editorial gave) funds collected by this department for registration of motor vehicles and of corporations are not included. The gross collections for the State for 1914 and 1915 were \$496,181.15, and in 1913 and 1914, \$828,996.41, making a net increase of this department for 1913 and 1914 over 1911 and 1912 of \$287,943.11."

I write to call your attention to these facts as they appear in the official record. The conclusion you have published, in which you lead your readers to believe that receipts of this department were reduced \$61,000.00 for the 1913 and 1914 period over the 1911 and 1912 period, and that the expenses were increased \$6,279.00, is a very different conclusion from the final conclusion that the State treasurer officially reached, and which the official record actually shows, namely, that there was a net increase of receipts from this Department for 1913 and 1914 over 1911 and 1912 of \$287,943.11. Please observe that this more than a quarter million increase in receipts is a "stand-pat" that I am not misquoting the State Treasurer's official report, I am mailing you, with my compliments, marked copy of said report.

I can not believe that the "Globe-Democrat", however partisan, "stand-pat", or republican, that it hopes to be, can desire to have a campaign upon a conclusion so false, erroneous and in conflict with the official record as is the conclusion that your readers must reach from perusing the statement in this morning's editorial. Even so distinguished a "stand-pat" as ex-President Taft has frequently said that "Truth is mighty and will prevail."

The misrepresentation that your editorial has made in the case of this Department is but a sample of the misrepresentations that have, from time to time, appeared in your columns concerning the finances of other State departments. In the interest of honest Missourians, irrespective of party, in the interest of truth, as well as of decent journalism, I am asking that you give this letter the same prominence in your paper as you have given the defective and incomplete statements you have published. All official records of the State are open to the public. The entire truth about these records will be given to the public before it has an opportunity to register its will at the polls. If you will join the honest publishers of all parties in this State in informing the public what the State records truthfully show, by giving the whole truth, as suggested in this letter, you will escape the condemnation that the public is sure to heap upon your paper, if the policy displayed in your editorial of today is continued.

Let the Whole Truth be Known.

Missouri's total receipts into the general revenue fund, July 1, 1915, the fiscal year just past, were \$5,998,494.47. The expenditures for the public schools during the biennial period, 1913 and 1914, (appropriations being made for two years at a time), were \$6,865,899.88. The two sums above enumerated are larger than ever before, and the percentage of the State's total income spent for schools is also much larger than ever before. A moment's study of the above figures will show that over one-half the State's total general revenue was appropriated by the General Assembly to the public schools, a much greater

proportion, and a greater total sum, than any previous year, notwithstanding the insincere cry of a hostile press in advertising only part of the truth—to the effect that certain fees were this year excluded from the so-called "one-third" apportionment. While the "one-third" apportionment is smaller, that is but one appropriation. Other school appropriations made are so much in excess of their usual size that their excess much more than offsets the reduction in the only school appropriation that is smaller.

F. P. GRAVES IS DEAD.

The Greatest Lead Miner of Missouri Dies at Home in Farmington.

AGED 67 YEARS, 6 M., 27 DAYS.

(From the Farmington Times.)

Fayette P. Graves, a pioneer in the Lead Fields of Southeast Missouri and the enterprising spirit that organized the Doe Run Lead Company, died at his home in Farmington Saturday evening, pernicious Anemia being the immediate cause of his death, aged 67 years, 6 months and 27 days. Mr. Graves leaves a devoted wife and three children.

His death marks the passing of the only child born to the union of William H. and Julia (Parsons) Graves, who died when Fayette P. Graves was quite a little child. The latter, after the death of his parents, was sent to Hillsdale, Michigan, by his uncle, and while there attending the high schools until the age of sixteen. He then went to Massachusetts, and when eighteen years of age had his first experience in lead mining, at South Hampton in that State. He also, during his stay in that state attended Williston Seminary at East Hampton, walking to and from the mines, a distance of eight miles, daily, but before completing the entire course, left school and came to Missouri, where he was engaged in the employ of the St. Joseph Lead Company, in 1868, at what is now known as Bonne Terre.

After working in the mills for about two years, he took a position in the office, where he remained from 1870 to 1887, as cashier. He then moved to Doe Run, Missouri, having resigned his position with the St. Joe Lead Co. In 1886 Mr. Graves organized the Doe Run Lead Company, with a capital stock of \$200,000.00. He was appointed secretary and assistant Superintendent. Within a short time the capital stock was increased from \$200,000.00 to \$4,000,000, and a subsequent jump to \$10,000,000.00.

In 1871, while at Bonne Terre, he married Miss Mary E. Woodside, and to them were born five children, three now living: Dr. John P. Graves, Miss Trixie Graves, of Farmington, and Mrs. J. V. Braham of Cape Girardeau. Mr. Graves was a member of the Masonic fraternity; in religious matters, he was a Methodist. During his entire stay in Bonne Terre was sick but thirty days, and in the nineteen years of business at that place lost but four months of time.

In 1911 Mr. Graves tendered his resignation to the stockholders of the St. Joseph Lead Company, who had acquired the buildings of the Doe Run Lead Company by consolidation, his resignation was accepted. Thus ended his career of 43 years with the above named companies. After his retirement he moved to Farmington, where he resided until the end. For the past two years, Mr. Graves' health had been very poor. He was unwell several days prior to his death.

The funeral services were conducted at the Methodist Episcopal Church by Rev. W. R. McCormick of Kansas City, a former Pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Farmington. The active pall bearers were, Judge J. S. Clay, Albert Trauernicht, Ellis Horton, Louis Yeates, Julius Bone, and Will Kaestbaum. Honorary, Walter L.

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
