Annapolis News.

No rain here since I wrote last. A good shower would help. The drill on the Sawyer farm is now down to a depth of 500 feet. The rock is said to be as fine lead-bearing rock as any in the Flat River country, but no mineral shown up yet. Three men in town the past week looking for land. Annapolis now has two crews of the loaders out. They go as far north as Potosi, south to Williamsville, and east to Greenville. One crew of six men loaded 2,000 ties one day last week and quit long before dark. They are paid a cent and a quarter a tie, and railroad fare. 

An adjourned term of the Iron County Court was held at the court house, Ironton, beginning on Tuesday, September the 7th. There were present, Judge William Townsend, Judge Harry Holland, William Blue Sheriff and Arthur Huff, County Clerk. In the absence of Presiding Judge Harry Jones, Judge Townsend was, by the County Clerk, designated and appointed Presiding Judge for this present term of court. The Bellevue Valley Railway Co. filed with the court a plat of the proposed extension of said road. Requisition ordered for the "stamp money" due from the state to Iron county, amounting to \$85.96. Requisition ordered for the state school money due Iron county, aggregating \$3,616.13. George Hanson, County School Superintendent allowed \$100.00, salary. Road Overseers allowed warrants as follows: Andy Trast, \$50.00; D. W. Paris, 75.00; E. W. Holloman, 75.00; H. C. Jackson, 95.30; R. A. Dunn, 68.25.
