WABASH REFUSED STATE LICENSE

ROACH RETURNS CHECK REQUIRED TO COVER FEE ASKED BY STATE.

WILL ASK FOR COURT RULING

Secretary of State Holds That State Permits No Road to Operate Unless Incorporated Under Laws of Missouri.

Jefferson City. Secretary of State Roach has refused to issue a license to the Wabash Railway Co. to operate in Missouri.

In a letter to J. L. Minnis, general solicitor for the Wabash, Secretary Roach quoted a Missouri law, passed in 1913, which provides that no corporation except one incorporated in Missouri, shall be authorized or permitted to carry passengers or freight from one point in the state to another.

The Wabash, before its recent receivership, was a Missouri corporation, but in the reorganization it was incorporated last month under the laws of Indiana which permit railroad companies to go into the business of buying and selling railroads, and also outlines the manner in which these things can be confirmed.

Refuses to Exhibit Books. The practice of refusing permission to examine the public records at the state capitol has grown within a month from an isolated case into an epidemic, it was learned, when certain correspondents attempted to determine how much money is in the general revenue fund.

Beer Taxes Decrease. Tax receipts for beer consumed in Missouri during October were compiled by State Beer Inspector Speed Mosby.

Missouri Building Operations. Conservative estimates by the bureau of labor statistics indicate that new buildings erected in Missouri in 1914, alterations to old ones and similar improvements, were worth a total of \$45,055,955.

Coal Miner's Dilemma. A new regulation in a certain coal mine required that each man mark with chalk the number on every car of coal mined.

College Folk Get Married. It requires three pages of the current issue of the Missouri Alumnus to list the recent marriages and engagements of graduates of the University of Missouri.

Five Generations Present. "Uncle" John Henley celebrated his 92d birthday near here last week, and five generations were present at the celebration.

Convicts Seek Parole. Thirty-one applications of convicts in Missouri penitentiary for paroles will be heard by the board of pardons at the next meeting.

School Boards Unite. Four widely-known attorneys will join with A. T. Dumm in the preparation of briefs to be filed in supreme court in support of State Superintendent Gass' mandamus suit to compel Auditor Gordon to apportion \$514,503 additional to the school children.

Morris' Friends Busy. C. D. Morris, editor of the St. Joseph Gazette is being boomed by hundreds of friends for the Republican gubernatorial nomination and is an open advocate of the land bank measure.

Petitions Circulated. The land bank state committee has commenced circulating initiative petitions to place the constitutional amendment on the ballots of the next election.

Rolla School Asks Ruling. The case of Harry T. Helmberger against the board of curators of the University of Missouri was argued and submitted in the supreme court en banc.

The passage of the act was bitterly fought in the general assembly. Friends of the university declared it was a blow aimed at the institution.

The curators declined to apply the Buford law and the suit was brought to compel them to recognize it.

It was contended in the presentation of the case in behalf of the School of Mines that if the Buford act is constitutional, its effect for good or evil cannot enter into the disposition of the case by the court.

Directions were issued by his department to two road-building outfits in Osage county, one at Linn and the other between Westphalia and Rollins Ferry, to work two shifts.

"The two Osage county outfits," said Col. Buffum, "will work 16 hours a day, one shift from 4 a. m. to noon and the other from noon to 8 p. m."

Similar directions were issued to three grading outfits operating in Texas county and others will go out to other counties.

The total is \$35,937.16, as against \$39,446.79 a year ago, a decrease of \$3,509.63.

This decrease is in keeping with the general falling off of the consumption of beer in the state, as indicated by the inspection tax all during the year.

In the first 10 months the beer tax has fallen off \$76,749.87, as compared with the first ten months of 1914.

This decrease shows that so far this year there has been drunk in Missouri 362,820 barrels of beer less than during the same period of last year.

Reduced to gallons this is 5,237,420.

United States Senator James A. Reed, whose series of Democratic meetings in seven Missouri towns have been almost stolen from him by the horde of office seekers in the state, has outlined a short three-day tour which he will make this week in the northern part of the state in the hope that he can have a few meetings without interference.

Although Governor Major has not formally announced his candidacy for the senate, it is known that Reed considers him as an active candidate, and has looked with some disfavor on the use of officials of the Kansas City police department in promoting the Major ambition.

The receipts into the general revenue fund for the month were \$157,910.90, and the disbursements out of the fund totaled \$122,889.95.

John E. Swanger, former secretary of state has, practically decided to become a candidate for governor on the Republican ticket. He will oppose the so-called "old federal" crowd and E. E. McJimsey.

Word comes from Montgomery City that Prosecuting Attorney Nowlin has filed a second suit attempting to oust William Versey as sheriff. He alleges neglect. The case is set for November 9.

The funeral of Warwick Hough, former chief justice of the supreme court of Missouri was held in St. Louis, Saturday, Oct. 30. He was 80 years old, and leaves a widow and five children.
