Overseers for the seventeen road districts in the county are to be appointed by the county court next week. The Fredericktown papers seem to be somewhat exercised over the prospective removal of Marvin College from that town.

Bad roads have seriously retarded the lumber business since the first of the year and the mills are behind with their orders. Poplar Bluff wants a Hamilton-Brown shoe factory, but is having some difficulty in raising the \$50,000 necessary to secure it.

After the rain ceased Sunday it grew cold and the past two days have been like winter—in marked contrast to the two weeks preceding. The water Sunday was hardly as high as last August and Marshal Fisher says our streets were not nearly so badly damaged this time.

Geo. C. Orchard of Poplar Bluff, U. S. Deputy Marshal, was in town Saturday to attend the preliminary hearing of the west end timber cutters. Notwithstanding we grew pretty fair crops last year corn is already being imported. Two cars were shipped into the valley the past week.

Herbert, Joe and Enoch Barton pleaded guilty to timber stealing in Squire Rasche's Court Monday and were each sentenced to forty days in jail. Harry R. Holland has applied for letters of administration on the estate of his father, the late Judge H. R. Holland. The estate is worth about \$5,500.

Mr. Delano tells us that on an average our weather was five per cent colder in December than it was in January. We would hardly have thought so. Wayne county people are petitioning the county court to order a special election to submit a proposition to the voters to bond the county for \$200,000 to build roads.

G. A. Buckley of Ironton spent Sunday night with his sister, Mrs. Fred Schmitz and family. He went to St. Louis Monday where he had been called on the Federal jury.—De Soto Times. The mail carrier from Sabula to Centerville came near being drowned in Big Creek, at Sabula, last Thursday. The team and rig were washed down stream, but finally landed on the other side. A lady passenger and child escaped without injury.

Eugene Whitworth, who is with the Simmons Hardware Company in St. Louis, came from St. Louis Saturday evening to spend a day with his parents, but had to prolong his visit on account of the high waters. Gene is held in high esteem by his employers. The total personal assessment in Iron county for 1915 is \$710,193, as against \$679,093 for 1914. When it is taken into consideration that the two years past were drought years and a great deal of live stock had been shipped out the showing for 1915 is good.

Bonne Terre Correspondence in Flat River News: "The St. Joe Lead Company are drilling the whole of Bozotown. They have drills all over town and are running them day and night. It is almost an assured fact that this year will be a banner year for Bonne Terre, and the business outlook is good. Two months ago a good house was easily found, but now it is a difficult matter to get a good house in a preferable part of town."

The rainfall for January was 12.18 inches. Some rain. Some other means should be devised of maintaining the road between the two bridges between here and Arcadia. The waters Sunday washed it away just like they did last August. The repairs come too high to be made every few months. And then the interference with traffic is annoying and expensive. The Frisco bridge across the Merrimac river has been put out of commission by the high waters and all Frisco trains go into St. Louis over the Iron Mountain from Horine. There is apprehension in regard to the Iron Mountain bridge over the Merrimac. If it should go down we surely would be without train service. Section 6548 Revised Statutes of Missouri: "It is unlawful to gig fish or spear fish during the months of January, February, March, April and December of each year, and they may not be offered for sale when taken by this means. It is likewise a misdemeanor to fish under the ice, or to take, catch or kill any fish in any manner in any water of this state upon the surface of which ice is frozen. The use of any seine, trammel-net, gill net, fish trap, firearm, device or means other than by ordinary hook and line, gig, spear, trot line or artificial bait is also prohibited. During the open season on gigging and spearing, the bag limit is fifty pounds. It is also a misdemeanor to offer for sale fish that have been gigged or speared."

We had an unusually heavy rainfall the past week and from Wednesday night until Sunday night the precipitation was 9.40 inches—unequaled in any of his former records, Mr. Delano tells us. In consequence all the streams were filled to overflowing, fields inundated, fences and bridges washed away and much damage done to the roads. The waters were highest Sunday morning shortly before day, the rain for several hours previous, having been unusually heavy. Stout's creek was hardly as high as it was last August, but the causeway between the two bridges between here and Arcadia was washed away, and the approach to the bridge across Knob creek from the south was taken away. Reports of similar disasters come from every part of the county. Sheriff Blue and Jos. H. Haven of Graniteville received a thorough drenching while fording the Middle Fork of Black River between Centerville and Lesterville last Thursday about noon. They had been to Centerville to make a land sale and started home. When they reached the Middle Fork ford Sheriff Blue says that he saw there was much water in the stream and hesitated to drive in, but Haven said he was familiar with the ford and to go on. The Sheriff went ahead but he hadn't proceeded far until both horses were swimming and the buggy was floating like a boat. He just let the horses float with the tide, pulling them toward the other bank where they finally landed, safe and sound, but drenched to the skin. The result might easily have been much more disastrous.

The following from the Newport (Ark.) Independent will be of interest to the citizens of Ironton who acknowledge the musical proficiency of Mrs. Damon with regret that her talent is no longer an asset of this community. The railroad was damaged greatly by the high waters. We have had no through trains since No. 7 went south Sunday morning. There was several feet of water over the tracks at Blackwell and some landsliding in the Cliff Cave neighborhood. But this was all over soon Sunday and No. 23 came from St. Louis Monday noon. The great damage is between Leeper and Poplar Bluff where the track is said to be washed out for miles, conditions being even worse, it is said, than they were last August when several weeks were required to get the track in shape. All the through trains are going over the track on the Illinois side and will probably continue to do for several days. We had our first mail and St. Louis papers since Sunday brought to us on train 23 Tuesday, which will probably be our mail train from the north until the through trains are on the road again. An old Ironton boy, Mr. Albert J. Zwart, at present Grand Junction, Colorado, will next week be united in marriage to Mrs. Maude Bunting of that city. A singular feature of this romance is that thirty years ago Mrs. Bunting, then Miss Maude Wilson, spent several months in Ironton living with her relative, Mr. W. H. Catern, who spent a year or more in what was then known as the G. A. Moser home on Shepherd street, now occupied by Mrs. Davis, just north and across the street from W. T. Gay's residence. Mrs. Bunting's former husband has been dead about five years; she is owner of the Grand Junction Sentinel and has two daughters and a son. Mr. Zwart is president of the Redlands Irrigation and Power Company and the representative of the Henry L. Doherty interests in the Grand Valley. He is now at Brown Palace Hotel in Denver where he will spend a month closing up his business affairs and then he and Mrs. Zwart will spend a year traveling and resting between Kansas City and Texas points, St. Louis and Southeast Missouri. Bert Zwart is well known to Ironton people, having been born and reared here. He is one of the most successful of our valley boys and worthy in every way. There is lots of water down in that country; the Belmont trains only run to Charleston, and the Cotton belt trains to the west end of the section. You cannot see the rails, section men, with high boots on, keep the driftwood off the track. They are looking for still higher water; thousands of acres of wheat are under water, and lots of corn piers surrounded by water. There is quite a lot of corn in that country. The Charleston Milling Company has 100,000 bushels of corn on the ground without shelter. The pile of corn is 50 feet high and 200 feet long. Just a thin shed over it. Sorry to hear of Hon. W. R. Edinger's sickness. Hope he may be out soon. On my way back I stopped in Farmington with my daughter, Mrs. Geo. W. Morris. They had the biggest fall of sleet ever known in that section. The electric lights were put out of commission by the wires and posts breaking down. The town was in darkness 24 hours and coal oil lamps and candles were used. I spent two nights and one day there. My old friend, J. M. Orris, came up and spent the day with me. We were boys together in Virginia, and when the war broke out he enlisted in Gen. Jackson's command and carries a minnie ball in his shoulder yet. I served one year in the artillery and three years in the cavalry. In the winter of 1891 I was stationed at Chesapeake Bay. It was thirty miles wide and we sold ice to the Germans passing from Baltimore to Fort Monroe. We talked over bygone days in that cruel war.
