

WOMAN'S PART IN STATE WAR SAVINGS

WELL QUALIFIED TO TEACH THRIFT TO YOUTH OF THE COUNTRY.

SCHOOLS THE BEST MEDIUM

Woman's Committee of Council of National Defense Has Been Enlisted in the Cause of Thrift.

The woman's part in the Thrift and War Savings plan throughout Missouri will be conducted through the Woman's Committee, Council of National Defense.

Mrs. E. F. Bush, chairman for Missouri of the Woman's Committee, Council of National Defense, has issued orders to each of the 100 county chairmen and the 1,000 chairmen throughout the state of Missouri to assist Mrs. Theodore Benoit of St. Louis, who has been appointed chairman of the Woman's Division of the War Savings Committee of Missouri, by Frank A. Vanderlip, national director of the War Savings Committee.

In some of the counties the county chairmen appointed chairmen of the Woman's Division other than members of the Woman's Committee, Council of National Defense. However, the defense chairmen in those counties are co-operating with the chairmen appointed by such county chairmen.

The Woman's Committee, Council of National Defense, is the only federalized body of women organized especially for war work. The committee was organized by an act of Congress last April for the purpose of conserving the woman power and unifying and co-ordinating all women's war activities.

A number of the chairmen of the Woman's committee in the Council of National Defense are county superintendents of public schools, who are doing effective work through the schools of their respective counties in directing a thrift propaganda. Among them are: Miss Sallie Brown, Troy, Mo., Superintendent of Public Schools of Lincoln County; Miss Roxane Jones, Milan, Mo., Superintendent of Public Schools of Sullivan County; Mrs. Margaret Squires, Superintendent of Public Schools of Carroll County. Other chairmen who report that the work is well organized in their counties are: Mrs. J. Hal Lynch, St. Louis County; Mrs. George E. Harris, New London, Ralls County; Mrs. Sam B. Cook, Jefferson City; Mrs. Ernest Simonson, chairman of Cole County; Mrs. M. C. Horton, Poplar Bluff, Butler County; Mrs. W. E. Matlack, Kahoka, Clark County; Mrs. Edw. Scharif, St. Marys, Ste. Genevieve County; Mrs. Rose Ingles, Columbia, Boone County; Mrs. Turner McBaine, chairman of the Woman's Committee, Council of National Defense, is working with Mrs. Ingles to make Boone County the banner county. Miss Juanita Pelegrin of Marshfield, Webster County; Mrs. Robert Lamar of Houston, Texas County; Mrs. R. E. Brown, St. Joseph, Buchanan County; Mrs. Charles Potts of Warsaw, Benton County; Mrs. J. M. Mitchell of Greenfield, Dade County; Mrs. N. A. Franklia of Unionville, Putnam County; Mrs. Clara Graham of Charleston, Mississippi County; Mrs. W. P. DEALING WITH SLACKER BANKS

Festus J. Wade's statement that there are 300 banks in Missouri that are not handling Thrift Stamps or War Savings Certificates because they are too stingy to give up a cent of profit on any sort of transaction is surprising, but he is in a situation to know the truth of what he says.

The banks of the state operate under special laws which give them certain advantages. As public institutions they ought to be public spirited, and the men who own them ought to see that their profits are bound up with the prosperity and safety of the country.

Evidently this thrifty 300 lack the capacity for taking large views of their business, to say nothing of a capacity for patriotic self-sacrifice. The way to deal with such men is not to argue with them. The dollar blinds their eyes and seals their minds, but, rightly used, the dollar can be made to instruct them.

The method is simple. If these men have not patriotism enough to put their country ahead of their profits, then patriotic business men should see that the profits go only to patriotic banking institutions. — Editorial from St. Louis Republic, January 18, 1918.
