

QUESTION.

Under Republican Rule.

(Potosi Journal.)

It is very probable that concerted action will soon be taken by the holders of outstanding treasury warrants of this county to enforce their liquidation. Action for judgment may be filed for the August term of circuit court, which if allowed will result in an order from that court to the county court to raise the funds with which

to satisfy the judgments. The county court will then issue and sell bonds in an amount sufficient to cover the claims, and order a special levy for the redemption of the bonds. This is the process by which several other counties in the state have taken care of their outstanding obligations. The situation in this county is becoming intolerable to the holders of unpaid treasury warrants, some of which go back as far as 1912, in as much that there can never be a sufficient surplus in the ordinary revenues to pay this debt. The county clerk's report on the fiscal condition of the county for the year ending March 15, 1919, shows an outstanding indebtedness of \$12,390.04, which bears interest at the rate of 6 per cent.
