Bonus Proposed.

A joint and concurrent resolution submitting the question of giving a bonus to Missouri soldiers who served in the world war to be submitted to the voters of the state at the special election to be held August 2, has been introduced in the senate.

The measure provides for a bond issue by the State Fund Commission to pay former servine men \$10 a month for each month of service with the provision that no one shall receive more than \$250 for twenty-five months service. The measure has the sanction of the American Legion.

For several years the Bunker-Culler Lumber Company has been operating at Bunker, in Reynolds county, but now all the timber has been cut and no more logs can be secured to operate the company's big mills. They will be moved away. The lumber "jacks" made Bunker a real live town for a time. Soon after the Current River Railroad was built through the northern part of Howell county the Bunker-Culler Lumber Company started a lumber yard at Mountain View where they operated a planing mill. Their saw mills were back in the interior. It took only a few years to cut out the timber and the mill moved back to Bunker. Now the timber is all gone and newer fields must be located. One by one the saw mills are cutting out the timber until they will only be a memory of the past in the Ozark region.—Howell County Gazette.

The State of Missouri to the above named or described defendants—Greetings:

You are hereby notified that an action has been commenced against you in the Circuit Court of the County of Iron, in the State of Missouri for the purpose of securing a judgment and decree of partition of the following described real estate, situate in the County of Iron, and State of Missouri, to-wit:

The southeast quarter of the south-

east quarter except two acres, more or less, in the northwest corner of said tract as deeded to Wm. Gilmore, containing the spring in said tract above described—all in section three (3), township thirty-two (32), north, range three (3), east;

Also, the following described tract of land, beginning at the northeast corner of section ten (10) in township thirty-two (32), north, range three (3), east, running thence south 85 degrees west 20 chains on section line to an established corner, thence south at 13 chains set a rock from which a white oak, 10 inches in diameter, bears north 15 degrees west 25 links distant, white oak, 9 inches, bears south 85 degrees, 8 links, thence north 89 degrees at 60 chains set a rock in the east line of said tract of land, from which a black gum, 12 inches, bears south 84 degrees, east 21 links, white oak, 12 inches, bears south 50 degrees, west 16 links, thence north 5 chains, 73 links to the southeast corner of land of Joseph Huff survey, thence west 14 chains and 38 links to a corner of said Huff's land on the west side of Big Creek, thence north 67 degrees, west 21 chains and 50 links to the intersection line of section, thence south 85 degrees, west 5 chains and 75 links to the beginning, containing 74 and 16 hundredths acres, including area covered by the railroad, as per decree of Circuit Court at Volume 3, page 399—all in township 32, north, range 3, east;
