Mr. Elwood Collins Tual, the son of Mr. Ezra and Mrs. V. M. Tual, was born in Arcadia, Missouri, on January 21, 1872.

After completing school he was a clerk in Whitworth's Store in Arcadia for fifteen years. Later he became post-master and then became a merchant. He was joined in business by his brother and the firm was known as Tual Brothers.

In 1895 he went to Montana, Idaho, the Rocky Mountains, and from thence to nearly all the Western States.

On Sunday, October 20, 1901, he was married to Miss Maple Matkin. Mr. and Mrs. Tual took a bridal trip to the Pan-American exposition in Buffalo, New York.

To this union were born three daughters, Eugenia, Hazel and Julia.

In 1906, Mr. Tual went to San Antonio, Texas, for his health.

In the spring of 1916 he was stricken with paralysis, and the following fall was taken to the Barnes Hospital. After a lingering sickness for six years, he passed away at his residence on Friday evening, December 23, 1921, at the age of 49 years, 11 months and 2 days.

Mr. Elwood Tual was one of Arcadia's successful business men, and was highly esteemed. He was one of the most remarkable characters in sickness. He was never heard to complain of his sufferings, but patiently waited until the end. Through his strong faith in our Saviour, he was able to be happy and cheerful in his terrible condition.
