Veterans' Hospital, 5800 Arsenal street, St. Louis, last Sunday morning from the effects of poison gas inhaled while serving with the United States Army in France. He was 39 years old. The deceased was a volunteer in 1917 and was attached to the 26th—New England Division—taking part in the battles of Chateau-Thierry, St. Mihiel and the Marne. He was gassed twice and spent some time in a hospital in France before being returned to America. He had been a patient in the St. Louis hospital about a year and four months before his demise. All that remains of him on earth was taken to Ironton Decoration Day, and laid to rest beside his mother, who died while he was in France. Lead Belt News: "The different lead companies throughout this district posted notices Thursday announcing an increase in the wage scale of 10 per cent. effective June 1. The notice posted by the Federal Lead Co. was as follows: "Effective June 1st, 1922, there will be an increase of approximately ten per cent in the daily wage scale." The lead market has been active for several weeks. Lead was quoted on today's market at \$5.65. While wages have been low in the Lead Belt for some time, the men employed in the lead industry here have had the advantage of steady work the year round. This has not been true in any other industrial district in the country of which we have any knowledge. In the Joplin and Oklahoma districts the mines were closed down when the lead market declined to a point where it proved unprofitable to operate. This was also true in the mining districts in Colorado. Taking everything into consideration the Lead Belt has come through the period of industrial depression in fairly good shape. While wages were low there has been very little unemployment, especially in the underground departments. The present outlook is good, and with a rising market another raise in wages before the summer is over is a possibility."
