ELOPING POSTMASTERS.

Inspectors Investigating the West Virginia Romances. The Postoffice Department has not yet been officially advised of the elopement of Postmasters Walker, of Beq. W. Va., and Postmaster Sausbury, of Clay Court House, W. Va., with the wives of their neighbors, reported in to-day's dispatches. Inspectors have been sent to examine into the cases, and as soon as they report action will be taken. The conduct of the two postmasters was deplored at the Department, and in due time, if the reports are true, they will be dismissed from office, and their licenses by men content to remain at home with their own wives.

To Recover a Judgment.

J. Henry Hentz and J. Henry Hentz, Jr., trading as the firm of White, Hentz & Co., of Philadelphia, to-day entered suit against John Hayes, the hotel-keeper at No. 101 Pennsylvania avenue, for the recovery of a judgment creditor's bill for \$153.50, found in a justice's court on July 22 last. The complainant asked the court decree a deed made by Emily R. Killman to Cecilia Hayes, wife of the defendant, for lots 185, square 561, to be a deed of trust, for the benefit of Hayes, and that his equitable title in the property be held to answer for the plaintiff's debt.

THEY FEEL ENCOURAGED

Strong Pull to Be Made for Republican League Headquarters.

News From Chicago Has Caused a Renewed Interest in the Effort to Bring It Here.

The press dispatch in to-day's Morning Times giving an account of the discussion on the removal of the headquarters of the executive committee of the League of Republican Clubs from Chicago and the suggestion of the members of the committee to accept an offer to come to Washington, has caused considerable interest to be taken in the question in this city.

Although other places were mentioned to the committee and the final decision as to which city would be selected was held over until the committee's meeting in October, the interest taken in Washington gives the hope that the Capital City will secure the headquarters.

The language of the dispatch, which was to the effect that there was a strong sentiment at the opening of the meeting in favor of moving, indicated a tendency to locate in Washington.

Mr. D. A. Ray, of Washington, on behalf of the Republicans of this city, offered the free use of a suite of rooms at Willard's Hotel. The advocates of other cities put in their plea, and Washington would have been accepted had not Congressman H. C. Brewster, of New York, made an effort for his city, which caused Denver and Milwaukee to be heard from. This necessitated giving the matter further consideration, and the most acceptable place will be chosen at the meeting in October.

Those citizens here who are so frequently called upon for assistance in matters pertaining to Washington are to the front again and are leaving nothing undone toward accomplishing the change to this city.

Through the kindness of Messrs. M. D. and A. C. Lewis, proprietors of Willard's Hotel, a place to accommodate the committee has been proffered. These gentlemen, when the question of a change was first noted, saw the importance of doing something toward capturing the committee. In conversation this morning with a reporter for The Times, M. D. Lewis said he authorized the tender of rooms in Willard's. As these were about all the committee needed, and the importance of doing something toward capturing the committee, in his power toward making Washington the city where conventions or other meetings of large bodies can be held, and efforts offered superior to those of any other place, caused him to offer his rooms.

ONE SWINDLER CAUGHT.

Man Believed to Be R. L. Day Arrested at Washington Junction.

Detective Sgt. Perry, at police headquarters, received a dispatch about 9 o'clock last night from the sheriff at Washington Junction, near Point of Rocks, on the Metropolitan branch of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, informing him that a young man, twenty years of age, answering the description of R. L. Day, had been captured there, as he was alighting from a train.

Day is one of the young men who went about Washington with H. K. Balch, representing themselves to be young graduates of Dartmouth College and fleeing the alumni of that institution besides beating several of the hotels here.

Balch and Day are wanted here for passing a forged check for \$100 on David Curran, a department clerk. The spurious paper contained the forged signature of Hiram Hitchcock, proprietor of the Fifth Avenue Hotel, New York, who Balch falsely claims as his guardian.

Detective Boyd will leave here on the 9:30 train this morning to see the suspected man. He will be accompanied by a victim who will be able to identify either Balch or the other fellow with the many aliases. Numerous other cases will no doubt be worked up against the bogus college "Chimnies."

EMERGENCY RATONS.

Commissary Department Experimenting With One for the Army.

The Commissary General of the Army has received two of the reports asked for from the eight assistant commissaries general attached to the geographical departments of the service, on the expediency of adopting an emergency ration and the kind that should be used.

The other six are expected within the month, and when they are all in the Commissary General will render his decision in the matter. There is no doubt that some sort of emergency ration will be adopted, but whether his committee will be based on that of some European ration or be of an entirely new order will depend on the views of Commissary General Hawkins and his eight assistants.

Several specimens of emergency rations used by other armies have been received by Gen. Hawkins. That used by the German army is the most compact. It consists of a small cracker, about three-quarters of an inch square and a quarter of an inch thick, and is said to contain as much nutriment as a pound loaf of bread. Emergency rations are distributed to soldiers engaged in campaign service to sustain them if wounded or otherwise unable to procure food.

Police Did Not Interfere.

The free silverites, who attempted to hold an open-air meeting at Seventh and Market Space last Saturday night, succeeded yesterday in persuading the police to allow them to proceed without interference, and the meeting was held last night. Major Blood was in charge of the gathering and delivered the opening speech. Col. Samuel L. Baldwin and Mr. George Dixon were also present, and Col. Redstone, ex-agent for Coxey's army, was expected to speak, but did not turn up.

Ladies at the Outing Club.

The Washington Outing Club experienced an enjoyable occasion last evening, when the members turned out half a hundred strong to enjoy the cool air of the country clubhouse at Brookland. It was known as "ladies' night," and every arrangement had been made for the entertainment of the fair guests. Dancing was enjoyed until a late hour.

War On the Cotton Caterpillar.

The Egyptian council of ministers have formed a commission to investigate and determine practical means for the destruction of the cotton caterpillar in that country. The commission will be assisted by a botanist, an entomologist, and a chemist. Twenty-five hundred dollars has been voted to defray the expenses of the investigation.

Government Receipts.

The receipts from internal revenue to-day were \$446,938; from customs, \$776,778; and miscellaneous, \$79,485. The national bank notes received to-day for redemption amounted to \$343,867.

GARBAGE LEFT TO ROT.

Complaints Cause the Appointment of Another Inspector.

The city is divided into two divisions, and the complaints received are passed to the inspectors according to the division lines, each having his special territory. The other inspector is Mr. George M. Slye, who has been in the service for several months.

The appointment of the "additional" inspector is made under the provisions of the new contract, which empowers the health officer to recommend an increase in the force whenever, in his discretion, the necessities of the situation require it.

Blaze in Naval Lodge.

An alarm was turned in from box 516 about 2 o'clock this morning for a fire in the building of the Naval Masonic Lodge, No. 4, at the corner of Fourth and Pennsylvania avenues. A box of papers in one of the committee's offices caught fire in some way and was the cause of the alarm. Some of the painted woodwork of the room was slightly damaged, but the loss is small.

STUDYING ELECTRIC SYSTEMS.
Distinguished French Expert at the District Building.
