She testified that when he returned home Saturday night he found his wife in company with Philip Johnson, a hackster. He continued to tell a long tale about his family affairs, but the judge thought he had brutally assaulted her without provocation and Mayo was given sixty days in jail.



SEE WANTS REDRESS.

Woman Property Owner Objects to Plumbing Bills.

Mrs. M. S. Wynne, who owns considerable property in the northwest section of the city, called upon Commissioner Powell to-day with a complaint and a demand for redress concerning the enforcement of the plumbing regulations against her after the work required had been once attended to and been passed upon by the inspector.

Mrs. Wynne stated that two years ago she was obliged to have the plumbing renewed in a building at No. 917 Sixteenth street, and that recently she was notified to have the work done over again. The first occasion involved an expense of \$200 and the last time it cost her \$95.

She asked that she be reimbursed for the last outlay, since the work should never have been passed by the District inspector if the plumbing was not according to the requirements.

Mrs. Wynne said the same thing occurred at another house belonging to her at No. 1027 Seventh street northwest, and she stated that her rents were all exhausted in the cost of repairs.

NOR LIEK POSSIBLE.

It was not found that the Commissioners can grant relief in the case, and Mrs. Wynne stated that she should never bring suit against the District for recovery of the money needless expended.

She does not object, she said, to having repairs made, to conform with all proper regulations for the protection of health, but she would not pay for the carelessness, negligence or incompetence of the District officials.

Mrs. Wynne had another matter for the attention of the Commissioners, which was as to the inequality of assessments. She stated that she owned a lot adjoining another, and that one is assessed at \$800, while the valuation of the other is placed at \$2,000. This matter she was advised to refer to the board of assessors.
