THE POLICE FOR CONGRESSMEN. Needs of the Police Force Are Fully Shown Below. CRIMINALS GO UNCAUGHT.

One Hundred and Fifty Men Should Be Added to the Presently Guarding the City of Washington. Complete Protection Shall Be Afforded.

It is a practical certainty that Congress during the approaching session, which begins next Monday, cannot ignore the urgent necessity, existing and shown from day to day in the States, for a material increase in the police protection afforded.

It is not a question of negligence from the police, but a natural result of Congressional parsimony, which requires a few men to cover an enormous expanse of territory, and holds the authorities responsible for that which they can by no means prevent.

It is a matter of fact, there are but two double boulevards in the city—the market and the Wisconsin—where the various precincts of the officers are expected to cover beats containing from one to four squares.

Washington is the fourth largest police jurisdiction in the United States. We have 72.9 square miles to cover with a total force of 475 men and officers, with almost 25 per cent of the force constantly sick, on leave, or performing permanent detail duty.

It is not infrequently happened that in some precincts there has not been a man on duty at the moment of the commission of a crime. The Executive Mansion demands the attention of 45 officers. Similar receptions given by members of the Cabinet and other high officials necessitate additional attention on the part of the police force.

Washington is pre-eminently a parade city. Almost daily there are large and small processions, which must be attended by a corps of police.

It is found very difficult to properly police the suburbs because of the scattered residences. Many of the villages should be as regularly patrolled as the city itself.

Every minute happening in the precinct must be recorded and a report transmitted. These men are under heavy load and hold certificates for all money and valuables turned in by the officers on duty.
