The conception of the costume is at once striking and beautiful, and the beautiful colored plate shows its effect when made up. The costume is described as follows:

Blue velvet is here handsomely combined with oriental silk. In the striking iridescent shades peculiar to the Persian coloring. Loops of shaded ribbon stand out from the elbow cuffs, and left side of basque, filigree buttons are placed on the jacket fronts three on each side.

Fa's of creamy point lace fall on each side of the close fitting velvet collar. The basque of velvet is rendered glove-fitting by means of the usual double bust darts, under-arm and side back gores, and a curved seam in centre back.

The deep yoke and jacket fronts of Oriental silk are included in the under-arm seams, the closing being effected invisibly at the left shoulder and under the edge of the left jacket front. Long, full puffs are gracefully disposed over comfocartable sleeve linings and finished below the elbow with pointed flaring cuffs.

The stylish skirt is shaped with six gores, that fit smoothly at the top, in front, and on the sides, falling in undulating folds of ripples below the hips. Three separate godets form the back, each expanding in the tubular folds now fashionable. A wide facing of haircloth gives the skirt a proper set at the lower edge.
