FASHION STRAWS.

VERY pretty, soft-looking thistle-downs in green, heliotrope, pink, yellow and cerise, are among the unique flower evolutions.

VIOLETS are brought out in various purple and green effects; roses in pink and pale green; poppies in green and shaded red, etc.

RHINESTONE becties, having bodies of enormous pearls of turquoise and wings of rhinestones and rubies, or turquoise, are very handsome.

BLACK and white ribbons in a great variety of hairlines, dots and novelty designs, will be favored as an offset to the richly colored ones.

JUDGING from the large number and variety of turbans displayed among the untripped hats, and the prominence given to them in the collection of pattern hats, the turban is destined to be a leading factor in spring styles.

COLLARS of all shapes and sizes, of jet-lace, ribbon, muslin, grass linen and embroidered or spangled horsehair are everywhere in evidence.

ACCORION-PLEATED chiffon frills are in large demand. These trim a garment beautifully and with very little work, which probably accounts for their popularity.

A GIRLIE of green satin put on flowered bellotrope silk has bands of narrow white gros-grain ribbons sewed on it, while a plain purple stock finishes the waist at the neck.

GIRLIES of satin ribbon, pointed back and front, are greatly in favor, and a new fad is to have small rhinestone buttons both in front and back, as if to hold down the folds of the ribbon.

THE collars on all the new gowns are cut very high at the back; inside have a ruche, outside, tabs of lace, and surmounting the neck a ribbon. All these combined must needs make rather too hot a fashion for midsummer, but for the present, at all events, must be worn.

THE requests for black and white ribbons corresponds with the liking for black and white hats. Fancy favors, Pekin stripes, small dotted patterns and checks and some of the best Easter bonnets will be toned up with black and white ribbon.

WOMEN AT THE HELM.

AMONG the curiosities of the Russian dominions is a group of customs, the most singular of which is the rule, surrounding the convent of Besjakow, where not only do women vote, but where they practically do all the voting and office-holding.

As the returns from agriculture are very meager in the district, and there are large towns and villages, the women of Besjakow neighborhood migrate to these towns early in spring to find work, leaving but few women and children at home, and not coming home to attend to the little matter of voting.

Inasmuch as the women have to do all the farm work as well as the household in this singular community, it does not seem strange that they rather insist upon holding the offices, and not assigning them to such old men as may be about. Furthermore, it is said that they have for a period of several years managed all the public affairs of the Besjakow district so well that the men are quite content to abandon the tedious work of government to them.

Sometimes when the "head woman" of the joint communes is presiding over a public assembly of women to pass upon important financial and other concerns, certain of the men have been known to come home for the purpose of merely looking on and admiring the method of procedure, or else of heartily felicitating themselves of being rid of so bothersome a duty.

HIGH-HEELED SHOES.


