RUSSE'S APPEALS HEARD National Board of Arbitration Has no Jurisdiction.

GOES TO A HIGHER COURT League Directors Will Determine the Legality of the Fines - Then the Case Will Be Considered by the Arbitration Board, Which Will Decide Whether Fines Are Legal or Not.

New York, June 9. - The national board of arbitration, the supreme court in baseball, consisting of N. E. Young, C. H. Byrne, T. Brand and A. H. Soden, held a special meeting in the Hoffman House yesterday. The object of their meeting was to determine whether the board could take jurisdiction of the case of Russel.

Russel's appeal was made on the ground that the club had illegally withheld salary due him, and he, therefore, could not be reserved under the provisions of the national agreement. The club has claimed that it has a right in the constitution of the league and the contract signed by the player to impose certain fines and penalties on Russel for violation of club rules.

As the matter appeared to assume the shape of a dispute between the club and player, the board decided that at present it had not full jurisdiction in the case and referred the matter to the board of directors of the League, to determine whether the fines were legally inflicted or not.

When the directors settle this question, then the national board of arbitration will have jurisdiction to hear and act upon the player's appeal.

By the players' appeal, who pretend to know it is openly asserted that there will be a job put up to deprive the New York club of the services of Russel, but President Freeman says he isn't worrying. He declares that when Russel's offenses, for which he was fined, are made known there will be no doubts as to the legality of the penalties imposed.
