Massachusetts Reform Club Repudiates Chicago Platform.

COL. HASKELL'S SPEECH

Free Silver Craze the Logical Sequel to the Protection Fallacy—Unhappy Condition of American Farm—The Foundation of All Popular Discontent—A Quick Remedy.

Boston, July 17.—Nearly 100 members of the Massachusetts Reform Club met and dined at the Parker House last evening. The main object of the gathering was to consider the present political situation. Col. E. B. Haskell, of the Boston Herald, presided.

Among those present were Edward Atkinson, ex-governor of Massachusetts; Henry W. Leland, president of the New England Free Trade League; Archibald Howe, R. H. Dana, Robert Treat Paine, Representative J. J. Myers, Jabez Fox, Gamaliel Bradford, John Estes and Andrew Fisk, esp.

Col. Haskell opened the speaking, and struck the keynote of the gathering. He said: "This country has reached a crisis graver than any other it has known since 1861. (Loud applause.) Without questioning the sincerity of anybody, it seems to be fair to say that various causes have brought together, or are likely to bring into dangerous proximity, about all the popular delusions, vagaries and quackeries which have in all ages threatened the stability of free institutions.

DEBASED CURRENCY THREATENED. "The country is today seriously threatened with the debasement of the currency, which involves the partial repudiation of all private and public financial obligations. It is not only proposed to change the standard of value, but to adopt a standard liable to constant fluctuations. To adopt silver as the standard under existing conditions would be as absurd as to steer a ship by the light of a moving vessel. (Applause.)

"It is as fair to believe that one of the efficient causes of this state of things has been the policy of extreme protection which has prevailed in this country for over a generation. (Renewed applause.) This policy has taught the country a mischievous lesson—that the power of the government is not to make and maintain artificial prices for raw products of the country. Who can question the logic of the silver miners when they demand that the much-valued principle of protection should be extended to their product. If iron and copper, why not silver?

"The protectionist manufactures of the naturally stimulated and protected industries, at the expense of other great interests, notably the agricultural and shipping interests.

"It is a condition and not a theory with which we now have to deal. At the foundation of all the popular discontent now so unequally arrayed against all the lessons of a century of history, is the unhappy condition of the American farmers.

"The farmer might get larger prices for his products, but the purchasing power of his money would be lessened. In only one way would he gain—by the repudiation of his debts. All who work for wages, all who have invested their savings, all who have insured their lives—the whole army of pensioners would suffer. Capital would be loathe to take care of itself. The severest distress would come upon the workers for wages.

"To prevent such national disaster and dishonor I am willing to set aside all the other questions in this campaign. (Applause.) As firmly as I believe in free trade, I am willing to hold that question in abeyance. A protective tariff only places an unnecessary burden on the back of labor. A debased currency poisons its life blood and destroys its strength."

It was resolved that the members of the Col. Haskell's committee on the subject were willing to throw political preference to the winds and unite upon any action which seems best to compass the defeat of the Chicago platform.
