GAS JETS ADD TO HEAT. Plate Printing Room at Bureau Almost Unbearable. GIRLS SUFFER THE MOST. They Are Compelled to Wash and Dry Their Feet All Day—Fans Fail to Give Relief—Women Employees Are Poorly Paid.

EVERYWHERE people are suffering from heat in a greater or less degree, but it is doubtless if human beings are compelled to work in a hotter place in Washington than in the plate-printing rooms of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing.

THE MAIN ROOM of this department is situated on the fourth floor of the Bureau at Thirteenth street and Maryland avenue southwest. There are over 500 girls in the establishment, and the vast majority of them work in the plate-room as assistants to the printers.

IT IS NECESSARY to have the plates heated in this manner in order to use them and these little stoves by which it is done, are burning all day long, and the heat which they engender, especially during the middle of the day, is times almost unbearable.

TO DO THIS they are compelled to stand during the entire day of seven and a half hours, surrounded by the burning jets. While it is possible for the male workmen to appear somewhat indolent, it would be impossible for them to remain sitting all day.
