LITTLE CRYING ANNIE FOLEY She Had Taken Champagne, and It Brought on a "Weeping Jag"—The Court Was Good to Her and She Was Loud in Her Thanks—Police Court Scenes.

Jessie Hicks, a well-known young man, was arrested last night on Pennsylvania avenue, in front of Ugram's drug store, by Policeman Duval, of the bicycle squad, for not having a light on the tandem he was riding with a young lady.

The light went out as the bicycle bumped over the car tracks on Fourteenth street, and Hicks was ignorant of the fact until Duval overhauled him and told him he was under arrest, to the great terror and embarrassment of the young lady.

ACQUITTED AT ALEXANDRIA

Mayor Thompson Dismissed the Case Against Frank M. Hill.

Charge of Promoting Policy Was Not Sustained by the Complaining Witness.

Frank M. Hill, charged with promoting policy in Alexandria, was acquitted this morning before Mayor Thompson at an early session of the Alexandria court.

There was no evidence to hold the Alexandria business man and he was discharged. In concluding the case Mayor Thompson sharply reprimanded the plaintiffs for their action. He said if they would swear out warrants for the person who actually wrote the policy and brought evidence against them he would be only too glad to convict them. On the other hand, there was too much of an effort at prosecution without any evidence at all.

The warrant was sworn out yesterday afternoon by Charles E. Harris, a bricklayer. Mayor Thompson informed Harris that he would have no trifling. Under no circumstances would he allow the warrant to be withdrawn, and Harris must appear and prosecute the case at his own expense. Harris insisted that policy was being conducted in the city, and he would exert himself to the utmost to have all his witnesses arrested.

The wife, Isabella Harris, said she, together with sister, Mrs. Estelle Mankin, played policy on August 28. She played a row of mixed numbers—"8-15-64"—which came out in the lottery company which, they alleged, Mr. Hill was backing.

They took the slip to the office of the company and insisted on being paid \$50. Mr. Hill, who was present, said the number was a forgery, and that the number, instead of being 15, was really 13, and it had been altered.

Mr. Harris then wrote Mr. Hill a threatening letter. Little attention was paid to it and it was followed by another of similar import.

They claimed that instead of going in person to the joints they sent messengers. Mr. Hill denied the charge, and the attempt had been made to get money from Hill.

It was said this morning that Mr. Hill will make steps to prosecute Harris, either for blackmail or for using the mails for blackmailing purposes.

WANTED TO BE PUNISHED. "Tramp" Bartender Foxwell Was Drunk When He Stole a Breastpin.

Frank J. Foxwell pleaded guilty to larceny in Judge Mills' court this morning, and was sentenced to six months in jail. The complaining witness against him was John Dickson, of No. 111 G Street, Iron City, who he stole a lady's pearl-studded breastpin.

BELT OF LIVING FIRE AT SEA

Strange Phenomena Witnessed on the Chesapeake Bay.

Water Lighted Up for Miles With Phosphorescent—Explanation of This Wonderful Display.

Dr. R. B. Adams returned this morning from a professional visit to Boston. The doctor made the trip on the Merchants and Miners' steaming Fairfax, and in addition to having an enjoyable voyage witnessed a wonderful sight while en route.

The magnificent phosphorescent display was about half a mile wide and fully ten miles long. The bay, as far as the eye could reach, appeared to have millions of electric lights under its surface.

The passengers on the vessel saw the light a long way off. It then resembled a prairie fire. When the vessel was close to the belt the light changed to a whitish green. The reflection was so strong that it was possible to read anywhere on the deck.

Capt. March, the genial and popular commander of the vessel said he had not witnessed such a display for eighteen years. All the passengers came upon the deck and watched the strange sight long after the boat had passed through the field. The phenomena was also seen from Cape Charles, Va., and other places along the shore.

Such displays have long been a matter of dispute among sea-farers, and many theories are advanced in regard to them. Even scientists take different views on the subject.

It is well known that certain kinds of dead fish, especially mackerels and herrings, shine in the dark. From a careful study of the body of a dead stock fish in a luminous condition, Dr. Pilsbry, an authority on this question, finds that the phenomenon is due to a grease which shines upon the fish and which contains some peculiar organic matter, that shines in the dark like phosphorus itself. Phosphorescent fish are frequently observed on the dead human persons who visit dissecting rooms by night.

Living animals having luminosity are extremely numerous, according to D. Pilsbry. A minute animal, very common in the English Channel, is pre-eminent for luminosity.

Dr. Pilsbry relates that he has found it "in such prodigious numbers in the detritus found at Ostend, that on raising a handful of it appeared like so much molten lava." This, he says, is the chief cause of the phosphorescence of the sea, often observed.

In some luminous animals, a phosphorescent organ, specially adapted for the production of light, has been already detected, and anatomical science progresses the same will probably be found in all organisms endowed with luminous or phosphorescent properties.

Forecast of September Weather. The Naval Hydrographic Office has issued the following forecast for weather during September on the North Atlantic Ocean: Moderate or fair weather generally; occasional gales north of the 35th parallel; also near the American coast; tropical cyclones or hurricanes very probable; fog west of Cape Cod, especially across the Grand Banks, also east of New England; icebergs in the vicinity of Belle Isle and to southward as far as the Grand Banks.
