Vienna, May 18.—The Neue Freie Presse publishes a dispatch giving an account of the landing of 4,000 Greek troops at Avlona, in Albania, with a view of making an attack upon the rear of the Ottoman force in Epirus.

ITALIANS DIE FOR GREECE.

Rome, May 19.—Ten Italian volunteers, including Signor Fratti, a member of the Chamber of Deputies, were killed while fighting on the Greek side in the battle fought on Monday at Domokos and seventy others, including Amilcar Cipriani, the socialist leader and orator, were wounded.

DEPRESSION IN ATHENS.
