DANGEROUS SHOALS AHEAD

An unusually severe attack of that tired feeling on the part of the Quakers and a superb exhibition of "how to put a slow twister over the plate" by Prof. "Win" Mercer gave the Senatorial aggregation a firmer hold on their position in the first division.

The Phillies got away with a running start and were two tallies in when the curtain went down on the initial inning. They added another to this number in the second, but Washington did likewise, and then Lord Wagner's outfit tied the score in the third by capturing a couple of runs themselves.

It was an interesting game, but it warmed the hearts of the fans, who spend their time "rooting" for the Capital City team. The Senators gained four points by winning the eighth inning, and then they placed themselves seven points ahead of Brooklyn, who gained one point on the even break with Boston.

The race between Brooklyn and Washington for the rear end of the first six promises to be, if possible, more exciting than ever between now and the close of the season. Today both teams meet the same opponents, they do not meet, and the only reason for this is because the chances are Wagner's outfit will manage to capture the closing game from Philadelphia, while the Grooms are almost sure of defeat at the hands of the Bostonians.

The next series, however, where the Washington outfit is to try to try them out and the Philadelphia tackle Brooklyn at Eastern Park, will probably tell a different tale. The Grooms are very hard propositions just at present and it's a pretty safe bet they take at least one or two games out of the series.
