GOOD NEWS FOR SPORTS

Yale Will Advocate a Revision of Football Rules.

TEDDY HALE COMES TODAY

Sam Boyle Complimented by Pennsylvania's Football Team—Stanton Abbott and Joe Gans in Fine Fettle. Little Michael Goes to Saratoga. Tom O'Rourke's Predicament.

All of Yale's coaches have felt that the rules of football need revision. They have not said so, however, because the objectionable features of the game were the formation plays which have been developed by Yale's opponents. Last year these plays defeated Yale, and Yale's football men were determined that until they were able to win against this style of play they would be silent. Saturday's game was a triumph for good, old-fashioned football. According to Yale's view the game demonstrated the superiority of this style of a game, which Yale has always clung to and advocated. It will be remembered that Yale's coaches have never invented any of the mass plays that have made football so dangerous. This year Yale played two big games with a week without having a single player laid up. Harvard had four men who had to leave the field, and Princeton had five. The question of revising the rules is a difficult matter. Yale's coaches refuse to talk regarding any plans they may have, but it is known that Yale will lead a movement for the abolition of mass and close formation plays.

Teddy Hale, of Ireland, champion long-distance cycle rider of the world, is due here today on the Erzerum. Hale will be one of the starters in the six-day race to begin in Madison Square Garden, December 6. He has had two months' training in England, and in his letters he says that he is in the best possible condition, and is confident of success. There will be forty starters in the big race from all parts of the globe. His opponent, Gans, is already down to weight, and will strip at 135 pounds. The colored boy is in good shape, and has won one of the best exhibitions seen in Baltimore for a long time.

When Michael started in his race with Struback this morning he weighed exactly ninety-seven pounds, the lightest weight he has ever carried in a race. At the conclusion of the ride he was puffed out, but not fagged out. After a brisk run down, he said he felt as good as he ever did, and immediately repaired to his hotel and went to bed. Yesterday he was up bright and early, ate a hearty breakfast, read the papers, and when the rain stopped went for a walk. He was as chipper as could be Michael, with his pacing outfit, leaves for Saratoga today, where he will continue in training until he returns to New York next Saturday.

Tom O'Rourke is evidently anxious to make a winner before he leaves the Pacific coast. For the first time during his long career as a manager, O'Rourke had two of his men suffer successive defeats. O'Rourke took the defeat of Dixon and Walkott very hard, and he is making every possible effort to arrange new matches, whereby his boxers will have the opportunity of reversing these defeats.

The stake entries for the Pacific Coast Jockey Club have filled exceptionally well. All the notable horses on the coast being entered. The California Derby, at a mile and a quarter, with a guaranteed value of \$5,000; has forty-eight entries; the English side stakes, at four miles, has thirty-five entries; and the Tarpey Stakes, fifty-eight entries.

Cornell University is to have a twenty-five mile cross-country race and has invited the largest universities to enter representative.

Jockey Keenan has been suspended for the balance of the meeting at Iron Hill for getting off poorly with the horse, The Manhattan.

The average entries for the Foam and Surf Stakes for 1898 and the Tidal for 1899, to be run at Sheepshead Bay, is 100 in each race.

"Tot" Sloan, the jockey, is helping Jimmie Barry to train his boys with Walter Croft, the English hantam, which takes place in England in the near future.
