

JOINT LABOR CONVENTION

One Hundred Thousand Wage-Workers Represented at Albany.

Consolidation of the Two Leading Labor Bodies in New York State the Chief Object.

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 10.—Delegates representing considerably more than 100,000 wage-workers of the State, will be present in this city tomorrow at the joint labor convention which will begin its session at noon at the city hall.

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The primary work of this convention will be the harmonious consolidation of all the interests hitherto represented by the two State labor bodies, the Workingmen's State Trades Assembly and the State branch of the American Federation of Labor.

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KNOCKED DOWN BY A THIEF

Mrs. Mary Marshall Still in a Precarious Condition.

Her Assailant Believed to Belong to a Gang of Crooks—Arrest of a Pocketbook Snatcher.

The detectives and police are looking for a dangerous thief. Mrs. Mary Marshall, at 406 H street northwest, yesterday afternoon, and the many open attempts at pocketbook snatching give rise to the theory that a gang of crooks are doing the town. Detective Hartigan, of the Sixth precinct, has been investigating the two cases, and this morning arrested Jesse Roy, who is held at the station on suspicion of snatching Mrs. Marshall's pocketbook Saturday night at Four-and-a-half street and Missouri avenue.

The attempted robbery on H street, when a boarder who encountered the burglar in her room and was beaten insensible with the butt of a revolver, is still in a precarious condition.

Cynthia, a boarder, was at dinner when the thief made his entrance, but Mrs. Marshall left the table sooner than the others and went to her room. Just as she got inside, the door she saw the form of a negro ransacking the bureau drawers. He must have seen the reflection in the mirror of the woman behind him, for she instantly brought the butt end of a revolver down with great force on her head.

She fell unconscious, without uttering a cry, and had not entirely recovered when her husband found her several minutes later.

The burglar had escaped, as he had entered through the door, and second-story windows, and was seen to climb the ground, which led to the belief that the man had gained access to the window in his own way, and the instant he saw the police he fled.

Mrs. Marshall is confined to her bed as a result of the affair, and suffering considerably with nervousness, which may result serious.
