VALE'S POSITION DEFINED. Will Not Form an Entangling Alliance With Any College.

TRYING TO DEFEAT POTTER. Sterling Elliott Has Opened Negotiations to That End—St. Louis Wants Carsey to Return—Tom Eck Heard From—The Britannia Sock Again—Sporting Gossip.

Word has gone out from Ithaca that the authorities and students are glad that the rowing argument is at an end, and that no further steps will be taken toward arranging a race with Yale. Despite this report, however, college men all over the country believe the Western New York crew will be on hand when the word is given for the big race next June.

Yale expects that she found it impossible to accept the terms proposed by the champions, and give it out that she still hopes Cornell will decide to meet her over the Connecticut course. Julian W. Curtis, a member of Yale's athletic council, and one authorized to speak on aquatic and football matters, yesterday gave a very clear explanation of the stand taken by his college.

I see the press and the public generally are inclined to regard Yale as recovered and dictatorial," he said. "but this is wrong. Her reasons for wishing to row only at New London are excellent. To begin with, it is the very best course in the country, and should have been the fixed place for holding all big college rowing contests. It outclasses Poughkeepsie far and away, because there is no danger of interference from tugs, steamboats and other disturbing craft, and because the current is not so strong that the crew nearest midstream has a decided advantage.

It is not in a position to answer for her.

"You say 'no entangling alliance' and yet Harvard and Yale are now racing under a five-year agreement. Do you mean to infer that this agreement will be renewed when it expires?" was asked.

"That is exactly. An annual three-cornered race would attract the widest attention, and at present there is no reason why Cornell should not expect to get in as easily in 1898 as she will be able to in 1897. But I am afraid that after her no other new crew will be given serious consideration. As I stated in my article, Yale is not after the championship, and absolutely will not meet all comers in any branch of sport, and especially in rowing."

It is intimated that Harvard, which has all along entertained the best of feeling for the Ithacans, is bringing strong influence to bear on them to agree to accept an invitation from her to engage in a race with Yale. In that manner, no more negotiations between Cornell and Yale would be necessary, and each could row the other in a race with Harvard as the earnest solicitation of the crimson.

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
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
