WOMEN TALK ABOUT JAPAN.

An Intelligent Gathering at Which Labor Is Discussed.

A goodly number of women convened slowly yesterday afternoon at the rooms of the West End Women's Republican Association, in New York, so slowly, in fact, that the president, Mrs. Robinson, felt constrained to inquire of her constituency: "Can you suggest anything to keep our members from being so late?"

"Put the time ahead," suggested a young woman of ideas, "and tell them that the meetings will be held an hour earlier."

"I've tried it," said the president, "and it does not work."

"Impose a fine, then," was the next suggestion.

"Good idea," agreed Mrs. Robinson. "I've known a fine to work wonders in some cases."

It had been announced that Mrs. J. H. Meredith would read a paper on "The Rise of Japan," but, owing to her inability to be present, Mrs. Robinson suggested that Miss Helen Varick Boswell read a recent article from "Guntton's Magazine," on "The Labor Problem in Japan," written by Fusaharo Takano.

The labor question in Japan was, according to the writer, destined to become the most serious question in the coming years. There were already signs of unrest, and below the seemingly peaceful aspect of the labor situation in Japan were gathering that portended an era of social revolution.

At the conclusion of the paper Miss Emma J. Wilson, a colored teacher from Maryland, S. C., was introduced and made a touching plea for assistance in the educational work she had been doing among her people. She detailed the small beginnings of the school fifteen years ago, in a dismal cotton gin, and the struggles made by the people of that section to support it. She is desirous of raising \$1,000 to erect and equip a building large enough to accommodate 500 pupils and give them a plain, practical education.

A discussion of the article on Japan followed. It was opened by Mrs. Robinson, who said that unless there were arbitrary enactments limiting the hours of labor, there could be no opportunity for laboring people to rise. Mrs. George Poole spoke, deprecating the long labor hours in Japan for the child workers. Mrs. Knowles referred to the condition of the young girls as most deplorable and worthy of the sympathy of all women. Mrs. Burns thought that they were happy, because they knew no better. Mrs. Poole spoke of their cleanliness as a nation, and thought that the long hours at work in factories, which prevented them from keeping clean, would bring a spirit of unrest as quick as anything could.

Miss America Phillips had always been interested in Japan, she said, because it was so mysterious. She gave a history of the Spanish occupation of Japan, and the intolerance which led to their being driven out by the Japanese and to the closing of the Flowery Kingdom to the world for 20 years.

NEW BILL AT THE COLUMBIA.

Manfield Appears as Dick Dudgeon in "The Devil's Disciple."

Before an audience only limited in proportions for those of the house Mr. Richard Manfield appeared as Dick Dudgeon in "The Devil's Disciple" last night at the Columbia. As will be remembered, the play is not nearly so strong as others in the actor's repertoire, while at intervals it merges seriously upon the melodramatic. Mr. Manfield's cast, however, presents the piece under a curb that checks all tendencies to recognize this fault, and in that way it assumes importance that hardly another player in this country could give it. The title



role itself is hardly remarkable for any other reason than that it is essentially different from the others with which Mr. Manfield has become identified. It is a younger, and, so to speak, a franker and quicker part than the star usually plays, and, for that reason, is noteworthy. If only for the display of versatility it permits. To admirers of Mr. Manfield it will go without saying that the interpretation was scholarly and artistic throughout. Mr. Johnson, Miss Blanchard, Mr. Andrews and Miss Briscoe all did clever work in supporting the star. "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" will be the bill tonight, with "Beau Brummel" at tomorrow's matinee, and "The Devil's Disciple" again tomorrow night.
