SPORTSMEN IN THE MARSHES.

The Initial Assault Opens Upon Reed Bird and Otisolan. With the first tide this morning the war on the game birds on the marshes and flats around Washington began.

Reed bird shooting has for nearly half a century been the favorite sport of the early fall around Washington. The marshes of the Eastern Branch, the Potomac Flats and the swamps on the Virginia side abound in reed grass and other vegetation, which afford the fish, oily seeds, on which the birds thrive and fatten for several weeks before the season opens.

This season the flocks are larger and more numerous, according to the reports of those who watch the marshes, than for a number of years, and the number of shooters was in proportion. The owners of rifles, who include the sportsmen about the marshes and through the reeds, secured many engagements for the first tide, which was at its height about 9 o'clock this morning.

Major Richard Sylvester, chief of police, is also game warden of the District, and the rigid enforcement of the laws for the protection of game birds has been due largely to his efforts. Deputy Game Warden Peyton Zeller has been constant in their watch on the marshes, and the luckless pot hunters who have fallen into their hands have been made to realize that the laws are to be enforced.

With the coming of the next Congress the sporting fraternity will make efforts to have new and more comprehensive laws enforced. It is thought that a law will be enacted forbidding the killing of birds every alternate day, and also making the reason for the killing of blackbirds and woodcock open with the reed bird season.

The season on the marshes along the lower Potomac opens five days later than in the District, and many sportsmen who begin the season here in the latter part of the season at the Potomac and Mattawoman feeding grounds, where the birds are said to be unusually plentiful.

THE RICHEY MYSTERY. Detectives Have Fruitlessly Followed Many Clues. Every effort is being made by headquarters detectives to find a trace of Mr. Thomas B. Richey, who mysteriously disappeared in this city about a week ago.
