FRACTIONAL BREAKS ON THE STOCK BOARD

LOSSES SUSTAINED BY DEALERS

Heaviness Caused by News From Paris Concerning Peace Negotiations.

New York, Nov. 18.—The stock market, after the opening, became heavy and fractionally lower with the trading element ranged on the bear side. The news from Paris regarding peace negotiations was regarded as disquieting and a bearish feeling was encouraged by hints of increased friction between the Pacific Northwest interests. A sharp break of over 3 per cent in Delaware and Hudson, and of over a point in New Jersey Central and a fall of 1-1/4 per cent in American Tobacco led to induce selling for both accounts.

Chicago Gas was an exception, advancing a point on rumors of a coming stock subscription privilege. Comparative firmness was shown by the Atchafalaya, Rock Island, and B. & O. issues.

In the general list the character of buying seemed improved. In Government bonds the three were up to 18 per cent. At noon the stock market was again irregular with the majority of the list below the opening quotations. Among the stocks which made gains were American Sugar, American Tobacco and Chicago Gas, the latter advancing 1-1/4 per cent. The balance of the changes were fractional. Trading continued active.

The Stock Market was very irregular during the morning today, one or two stocks being favorites, very strong, and the remainder of the list falling off badly. There was a large buying in People's Gas, Rock Island, Sugar and one or two other stocks and higher prices in all of them which was realized immediately. This picking out of a few securities and booming them is not an indication of general higher prices by any means and on the whole the market was a bearish one.

The favorite with a favored few yesterday and today was People's Gas, and those who had the advance information that there was to be a boost given to the stock realized handsomely by it. The Washington trader in this list, fortunately, there was a meeting of the directors of the company yesterday and another today. Mr. Flower bought heavily of the stock and talked an important Washington trader into a purchase of it.

Another of the flower favorites, Rock Island, was boomed today and showed great strength. Developments are promised for this company also and there is a generally bullish feeling on the stock.

Willitt and Gray of the Sugar Trust newspaper are responsible for the strength of Sugar undoubtedly. They publish a statement that the total raw sugar in sight is very small, compared with last week and with a year ago. The Trust is popularly supposed to have a fine control of a large part of this raw. If one insists in speculating in Sugar the best advice at present is undoubtedly to buy, despite the continued attacks of the bears.

There is much interest in tobacco trade matters among the brokers and speculators. The talk of the prospects of the new Union Tobacco Company is now taking definite shape, and is of a nature in every way inimical to the Tobacco Trust. It is predicted with great confidence by people who are closely in touch with the new company that its business will be very large from the first.

The annual statement will be an excellent one, showing large earnings and a most prosperous condition generally. The business of the road in this section has been very nearly if not quite the best on record during the last three months.

Burlington stock ex-dividend 1 1/2 per cent today. There was some activity in the stock, but during the morning hours it was weak.

It is reported that a seat on the New York Stock Exchange sold yesterday for \$25,000.

GIVEN THIRTY DAYS IN WHICH TO ANSWER CHARGES. Knights of Labor Assert That They Can Prove Powderly's Claim Illegal.

Ex-Grandmaster Workman T. V. Powderly's effort to force the Knights of Labor into a receiver's hands took one more legal step this morning. For Justice Cox, Henry A. Hicks, general master workman, and John W. Hayes, secretary and treasurer of the order, presented an affidavit in which they stated that they were obliged to attend a convention of the Knights and prayed for thirty days' time before making formal answer to Mr. Powderly's charges and claims.

They swore that the District property of the order, a house on B Street and valuable printing presses, would remain as it is now until they return, and that they would take with them on their Western trip no papers or documents except such records needed at the convention, which they would return.
