OBITUARY NOTES

Dr. Lafayette Chesley. Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 25.—Dr. Lafayette Chesley, a well-known newspaper correspondent and a contributor to medical publications, died last night in this city, aged sixty. He was born in New York and was son of Lafayette and Caroline Marcellus Chesley. His mother came from an old Dutch family, and was a cousin of Martin Van Buren.

Capt. James A. Anderson

New York, Nov. 25.—Capt. James A. Anderson, probably the oldest man who served in the United States service during the late war, died here Thursday night, aged eighty-four. He was a native of Christiania and had served on shipboard for seventy-four years. Capt. Anderson served first on Norwegian merchant vessels, then on the Mississippi River trade, being captain of a steamerboat. He was in the Confederate navy during the Civil war, on the ram Arkansas most of the time. After the war he entered the United States revenue service as pilot of the John A. Dix and afterwards on the Sewall and Winter. A doctor in the late war he was on the Seaward which did patrol duty on the Alabama coast, as a supernumerary to the navy. He was granted a two weeks' furlough because of a carbuncle from which he was suffering, but death cancelled the furlough.

Rescue of a Crew at Sea

London, Nov. 25.—The Norwegian bark Wilhelm Birksdal, Capt. J. Stangbye, from New York October 21, for Copenhagen, was abandoned at sea leaky on November 18. Her crew were rescued by the Norwegian steamer Arktis, Capt. H. Sten-Hell, from New York November 5, full-hull, and safely landed at the latter port.
