STOCKS NERVOUS AND EXCITED.

Declines in Railway Shares Followed by Irregular Recoveries. New York, April 7.—The stock market today naturally opened nervous and excited, with a continuance of liquidation in the new industrials and the specialties.

The declines in the railway list were only fractional. There were sharp but irregular recoveries from the lower prices made in the industrials, but the tone of the department remained feverish. Government bonds unchanged.

This morning's stock market was similar to the close yesterday in every way, with rapid declines in prices of the new industrials and other stocks that have advanced most in the past month.

During the afternoon the stock market recovered somewhat from the panic of the morning and rallies of 3 to 6 points occurred all over the list. It is feared by many, however, that the high price of the new industrials will be a temporary phenomenon.

Manhattan was the weakest stock on the list and amply justified the opinion regarding it expressed by conservative critics and operators heretofore many times.

The Federal Steel securities were not quite so weak as Manhattan. The common stock was off at one time, but the steel stocks held firm behind it.
