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EVIDENCE THROWN IN THE WAY. Alleged Trick of a Passenger Agent. New York, June 25.—United States customs officials who seized the fortune in jewelry and wearing apparel which was found in the baggage of Mrs. Phyllis E. Dodge, the friend of young Maurice S. Wormser, will probably cause a search to be made today for a champagne basket which was thrown into the upper bay on Saturday evening by a steward of the steamship St. Paul.

A singular statement concerning Mrs. Dodge's case was made yesterday by a special Treasury agent, who had been at the hotel where the jewelry was found. "There has been no actual seizure yet in the Dodge matter. We received information from Paris that the young woman was being held in custody by the police."

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Rev. John Mitchell Receives a Stroke. Cleveland, Ohio, June 25.—The Rev. Dr. John Mitchell, pastor of the Jennings Avenue Methodist Church, and formerly president of the North Ohio Conference, died here yesterday as the result of a stroke he sustained while walking last Tuesday.

Church Matters in Hawaii. Honolulu, June 18, via San Francisco, June 26.—The Church Defence Association, an organization that is seeking to have the Anglican Church in Hawaii transferred from the English to the Protestant Episcopal jurisdiction, has received a letter from Queen Victoria in response to an appeal to her to change the jurisdiction. The Queen replied that she had referred the matter to the archbishop of Canterbury. The archbishop says he is communicating with the American authorities at New York on the subject.
