

STOCKS MAKE ADVANCES

A Decidedly Better Feeling Prevailing in Wall Street.

Expected Retention in the Money Market Owing to the Treasury Anticipation of Interest Lends to the Forward Movement - Gratifying Railway Returns Also a Factor.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—This morning early cable advices showed that the London market was comparatively unaffected by the latest developments in the South African situation. Consols were a shade lower, but advances were the rule in the American quarter and speculative sentiment there was reported decidedly bullish.

At the opening of business the local market showed an uncertain tone, but it soon developed pronounced strength and advances were secured in practically every corner.

London houses sold moderately here, but this circumstance was without particular effect. Notably strong features of the market at the opening of business were C. C. C. and St. Louis, Chesapeake, Sugar Refining, the grangers, and Tennessee Coal and Iron. L. & N., which was reported particularly strong in London, was also materially higher here.

A number of gratifying railway returns were reported over night, including those of St. Paul Company for the first week of the month, but there was otherwise little that was of bearing upon the general situation or upon particular stocks.

The stock market this morning was active and buoyant during the first hour under the influence of the buying for both accounts and by the announced retention of the Government regarding the payment of interest on its bonds.

There was a generally better feeling in the street and a rise in the market was reported. There was a continuation of the professional market for a few days longer it was believed in many quarters that the coming month will see a much better market, perhaps a rise in the market.

The gross earnings of Ontario and Western for the first week of October show an increase of \$20,888. The increase from the beginning of the year is \$29,196.

The Vanderbilt group were active and strong this morning, making a good gain in the first half hour, but losing some ground later. The pretty well distributed belief that all of these lines will show immense September earnings, owing to the tremendous traffic in the West, was one of the reasons for the greater strength of the group.

There was a steady advance in the price of the stock of the first week of October, as usual, showing a fine increase in gross earnings. The total earnings for the week were \$91,805, which is an increase of \$69,702, the largest for several weeks.
