Invited to Make an Address. Major Richard Kyburger has been invited to deliver an address before the Police Union of the United States and Canada, which meets in annual session in Cincinnati in May.

Keene Literary Association. The Keene Literary Association will hold its annual reception tomorrow evening at St. John's College. An elaborate programme has been prepared for the evening.

Major Williams Improving. Major L. P. Williams, assistant clerk of the Supreme Court of the District, who has been confined to his home for about two weeks by a severe attack of grip, was reported to be much better today.

A Lutheran Church Incorporated. A certificate of the incorporation of Saint Matthew's Evangelical Lutheran Church of Washington, D. C., was placed on record yesterday.

Professor Thomas' Lecture. Prof. Cyrus Thomas, of the Bureau of Ethnology, this city, delivered a lecture before the community and alumni of the Academy of the Visitation at Frederick, Md., on Monday.

Cut by Flying Glass. In a collision yesterday afternoon between a car of the Metropolitan Railway and a wagon owned by E. K. Burton and driven by George W. Moore, a young woman, who refused to give her name, was slightly cut about the face by flying glass.

Archbishop Keene's Legacy. The will of Frances E. Griffin, who died March 17 last, was filed yesterday for probate. After providing for a bequest of \$100 to the Rev. John J. Keene, the testatrix directed that her estate be sold and the proceeds be divided among her four children, Maria T. Howe, James A. Aloysius B., and Joseph L. Griffin, all of whom are named executors of the will.

The District Not Responsible. The Commissioners of the District after careful consideration have decided that the recent accident to the bicycle of P. J. Novak, of 715 Seventh Street northwest, by an employee of the Poundmaster was unavoidable and that the District Government is not responsible for the damage done. The Commissioners' decision states that they cannot consider Mr. Novak's claim for damages.

For Scientific Discussion. A joint meeting will be held tonight in the assembly hall of the Cosmos Club by the Chemical and Geological Societies of Washington for the purpose of discussing scientific subjects. The first of these will be "Cause of the reddish color in ordinary ferrous salts," which will be read by N. H. Barton, and the second, "Secondary enrichment of mineral veins," by E. C. Dewey and W. H. Wood. The committee for the Chemical Society consists of H. C. Bolton, chairman; F. K. Cannon, V. K. Cannon, C. E. Whittier, and H. N. Stokes. The committee for the Geological Society consists of G. P. Merrill, chairman; N. H. Barton, and Arthur Keith.

Improvements to Streets. The District Commissioners yesterday in a communication to the Home Committee on the District of Columbia regarding the items in the appropriation bill providing for the paving of Fourth street to Lydecker Avenue and Lydecker Avenue to the east side of Thirtieth Street says: "Fourth street has been recently been widened by dedication from Whitney Avenue to Lydecker Avenue, and Lydecker Avenue has been dedicated between Thirtieth and Fourteenth Streets and Holmes Avenue and curb set therein under the permit issued from Holmes Avenue to Thirtieth Street Lydecker Avenue. As well built up and has been so for several years. The amount named in the bill, \$12,000, is believed to be sufficient for doing the work."

In east side of Thirtieth Street, between N and Dumbarton streets, abutting lots 1 and 2, square 1084, estimated cost \$300.


